Regional Board of School Trustees

This elected board hears petitions for annexations, detachments and changes in school boundaries. The Regional Superintendent acts as Ex-Officio Secretary to the Board. The Regional Office maintains all records of petitions heard in the region. The main responsibilities of the Regional Board of School Trustees are:

- The hearing and disposal of petitions for change of school district boundaries.
- The hearing and disposal of petitions by school districts to withdraw from Joint Agreements/Cooperatives.
- The appointment of appraisers and approval of final settlements in the division of assets when new districts are formed.
- Meetings are regularly held the first Monday of each quarter; special meetings are scheduled when needed.

November was a busy month with a holiday at the end that gave staff and families a much-needed break. New families continue to enroll and our community partners have continued to bless us with referrals. We are VERY close to being fully enrolled! This has us considering requesting funds for expansion of our services for next fiscal year.

November also finds us deep into preparing to be monitored by two different entities this year. The first is a February monitoring visit from our funder, the Illinois State Board of Education. Second is a quality endorsement narrative report that is due April 3rd to Parents as Teachers National Center which oversees our program model implementation. These two monitoring processes help ensure compliance with all of the regulations, policies, procedures and expectations outlined by our funder and program model for high quality programming.

Although these two monitoring processes are similar, they do have several significant differences. Together, monitors will look at:

- home visitor/home visit quality by examining videos of home visits with families
- documentation quality by examining family files for completeness and thoroughness

• overall program quality by conducting interviews with the program supervisor and program staff members and through evidence submitted by the program that demonstrates that we are meeting the requirements.

Our PAT First Years staff members have been working to prepare the requested documentation for the monitors since July, and beginning now, the work really kicks into high gear for the last push to the end. We can't wait for April 4th!

Education Outreach Program

The Education Outreach Program is now providing access to Pathful Explore for our students. Pathful Explore will provide our students with online career assessments, lessons on soft skills and career building, and access to hundreds of virtual job shadows. We are excited to offer this for our students and look forward to learning all the ways this platform can be utilized to assist students in their career planning.

As we are all aware, the importance of feeling included and validated can play a huge role in motivation and success for each student. We review an Individual Educational Service Plan every month and make every effort to collaborate with opportunities in the community as well as within the school district to address deficiencies in our student's lives.
