

This collaborative educational opportunity gave teens an introduction to drone use and demonstrated the technology and how it has advanced the broad impact on a wide variety of industries. Last year was its first year and it doubled in size from fall to spring. Trinidad State sends 10-20 athletes every week to act as instructors and motivators. Good public service for us."

- The Collaboratory (makerspace) at Trinidad State hosted 60 middle school students in June. Students learned about 3D printing by creating keychains, used the Glowforge laser engraver to make wooden puzzles, and crafted handmade greeting cards for family members using paint and markers.

- Dean of Instruction and Agriculture Program Instructor, Jack Wiley, has long been a supporter of local 4H and FFA (Future Farmers of America) contests. He has worked with agents, teachers, parents, students, and sponsors on a variety of projects over the span of his career. This year Wiley judged the State Leadership competition for the Colorado FFA for the 5th consecutive year. Last year Jack was recruited to be a judge for the National FFA proficiency awards program ranking applications from state winners from 42 states. Says Wiley, "What an opportunity to be able to work with and be around some of the state's and nation's most talented, best and brightest future agriculture leaders. It is also an excellent opportunity to "fly the flag" for the college!"

- BOOTS ON THE GROUND AWARD The San Luis Valley Joint Interagency Oversight Group (SLV Joint IOG) honors partner agency staff members with the "Boots on the Ground" award in recognition of employees who exemplify the spirit of cross-systems collaboration. One award recipient for August was Tanner Kingery of Trinidad State College. "For several years now, we have reached out and collaborated with Tanner to help us with vehicle repairs for families that we are working with," said Teri Sisneros of SLV Joint IOG. "He has always worked well with us and has done all he can to fit our families' vehicles into his process of teaching students. Our families' situations can be difficult sometimes and Tanner has always tried his best to accommodate and work around barriers. "He has been a part of this team and may not know what a blessing he has been to both the ISST team and the families who might not otherwise have been able to get their only means of transportation fixed. He has always been upfront and honest if the repair work was unable to be done in the class and not to give any false hope to the families. He has even let us know if the cost to repair would end up costing the family more than investing in a used running vehicle. "We are grateful to have people like Tanner who are willing to team up with us to help families in our community. Thank you, Tanner. Your thoughtfulness and willingness are greatly appreciated," Sisneros concluded.

Create education without barriers through transformational partnerships.




Trinidad State College's Workforce Solutions Program connects the college with the Southern Colorado business community in an innovative way that benefits businesses and their employees. This approach is designed to help the business community aggressively "grow your own" in a new and creative way. How it works: TSC will work with individual businesses to develop and tailor training based on each company's employee upskilling needs. Employers typically choose two to five classes from the list. The certificate is designed and granted by the employer. Classes are taught by TSC faculty and employees will receive college credit on a TSC transcript that may be applied to future degrees or transfer.

Vice President Lynette Bates shared information and research from her Doctoral Research Project Defense: First Generation College Student Belongingness. Doctor of Education (Ed.D.), Leadership for Educational Equity, School of Education and Human Development, University of Colorado, Denver. VP Bates defended her dissertation late spring. Included in her presentation were an overview of the study, research questions, methodology, findings, discussion and conclusions. Of powerful interest were student stories shared. "For all students, self-efficacy was the most frequently mentioned theme that arose throughout the interviews. Regardless of age, they expressed and understood the importance of "leading the way" for their families and demonstrated considerable "grit" in completing their pathway of study. Each demonstrated a sense of accomplishment and pride for completing their first year of study and getting near their goal of graduation." Thank you, Dr. Bates and Congratulations.
