

# **LCC Construction Updates**

## **Main Street View Housing**

The LCC Foundation has completed renovations on the first building of its promise to assist the college with additional housing. The west wing has students living in it this fall. The south wing is set to be completed in the next few weeks. The final phase - the north building - will house up to 18 students and give the college the capacity to accommodate students with disabilities. The north building also has a large apartment that will be used for staff housing. The property gives the college the ability to offer adult students off campus housing options as well as expanded capacity for student-athletes. The Foundation is fundraising to complete the north building.

CDOT highway construction on Main Streed has created a bit of an access challenge, but once students found their way, they were excited to see the new rooms.





#### **COPERR House**

LCC completed its first home remodel under the COPERR Grant awarded by the Colorado Attorney General's Office. The home at 406 East Oak Street in Lamar was completed in early May, and an Open House was held on Friday, May 6<sup>th</sup>. At the open house, students, their families and LCC employees were able to enjoy refreshments and appreciate all the hard work the students put into the project. The project began with the Fall 2021 Semester and was completed by seven Construction Trades students under the instruction of Rod Dunn and Jake Specht. The home is a 1 Bed, 1 Bath and is under contract as of August 26<sup>th</sup> with a planned closing date of Sept. 6<sup>th</sup>.The program is in full swing again with fifteen students and is beginning its second renovation project in Wiley, CO.

The goal is to complete the second home by May 2023 and sell the home shortly after. The proceeds of each sale will be returned to the LCC Construction Trades program in order to complete the process again. Below are before and after photos of the first COPERR home.





## Cafeteria Remodel

The old (emphasis on old... very old) Cafeteria in Todd Burch Hall received a much-needed remodel with the increase in student population. This remodel provides more serving stations, as well as an expanded salad bar for healthy and vegetarian options, additional seating and

tables and new flooring. Its new name is "The Café" (pronounced calf). Returning students walked in the door and said "Wow!"







#### **New Technology and Furniture in the Classrooms**

Multiple classrooms will be equipped with Distant Learning Technology to include two to four 85" Samsung Displays per room, new Epson Brightlink projectors, document cameras and audio/visual equipment. The set up is as easy as an Instructor plugging into the docking station to gain full control over each device, whether they want to mirror material or extend different material to different devices at the same time. The technology is also equipped with the capability for students to wirelessly connect to an individual device within the classroom.





The technology is meant to be a tool for educators and an experience for students. The furniture is new, modern, flexible, and supports active learning. As with many other changes, returning faculty and students are saying, "Wow!"

## **New Tech in the Library**

The LCC Library has acquired integrative accommodations technology for students who have visual impairments or processing issues. The C-Pen Reader reads aloud any text in real-time, in a variety of different languages, speeds, and pronunciations, and displays text in large print. There is an exam setting to support academic honesty. The Reader also saves what it reads to a text file, which can be opened up by the user for enlarging and changing font. Pen scanners and readers enable students to participate with handouts, exams, and other text classroom activities without having to make special accommodations or wait for large print versions.

The LCC Library has been able to meet all student demand for TI-84 graphing calculators. Available for free student checkout, the ability to afford a graphing calculator was formerly a significant barrier to academic success in college math courses.



Library Director Jennifer Goodland graduated in May 2022 with Masters in Library and Information Sciences from Indiana University's Indianapolis online campus. She focused on academic library administration, digital data informatics and ethics, and issues of indigenous librarianship. Her capstone project explored privacy ethics and access barriers in the National Archives and Records Administration's treatment of indigenous records.
