# **Board Briefing Summary**

#### Student Recruitment and Enrollments / Student Activities and Services

#### **Dean of Students**

HCC hosted the Washington County 2024 STEAM Festival @ HCC on Saturday, Nov  $2^{nd}$ . We saw an estimated 950 community participants, and over 300 families served. This is about 250 more individuals than last year! STEAM Festival is just one of many happening across the state during the Maryland's month-long celebration of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (we include the Arts in Washington County!) https://marylandstemfestival.org/. Ours is truly a collaborative event - made possible by generous financial sponsorship from HCC's Alumni Association (\$3600) and JLG (\$2000), publicity and marketing support from WCPS and the Washington County Public Libraries, and lots of coordination by Division Directors Lauri Montgomery, Nancy Arnone and Dana Poole, Beth Kirkpatrick and her Public Information & Marketing team, HCC Foundation Student Scholarship volunteers, Student Activities, and the Dean of Students' Office. Several student groups are involved, the ARCC staff helps tremendously, and HCC's Foodservice team keeps everyone nourished. Faculty are involved from all STEAM disciplines, including Health Science and Nursing. #### **Athletics**

The fall sports teams wrapped up the first weekend in November.

The Volleyball team played an **amazing** Region 20 tournament placing 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 8 teams! They defeated Potomac State in the quarter-finals and Montgomery College in the semi-finals to face the Harford Owls in the finals. We lost the match in three very competitive sets: 19-25, 19-25, 26-28.

The women's soccer team went into the Region 20 tournament as the 2 seed and faced Montgomery College in the semi-finals. We led for most of the game and were tied going into the 82<sup>nd</sup> minute when Montgomery scored, making the score 4-3 which ended up being the final for the game.

The Men's soccer team went into the Region 20 tournament as the 3 seed and faced Harford Community College in the semi-finals. We lost with a final score of 0-7.

The men's cross-country team and one female cross-country runner qualified for the NJCAA Cross Country National Championships in Richmond, VA on Saturday November 9<sup>th</sup>. Our female runner, Michaela Gross, a nursing student, placed a respectable 54<sup>th</sup> out of 184 with a time of 19:14.7. Our men's team, primarily made up of freshman talent, all improved their times over what they had been running during the course of the year. As a team they finished 28<sup>th</sup>.

The men's basketball team opened up the season, on the road, with a tournament at Louisburg College where they went 1-1 with a highly competitive group of teams. They played their home opener on Wednesday, November 6<sup>th</sup> with a hard-fought win over Divisional rival, Harcum College 79-71. The team will travel up to Monroe College for a two-day tournament on Nov. 14<sup>th</sup>. The team is currently 2-1.

The women's basketball team opened their season at home against Middlesex College on Saturday November 2<sup>nd</sup>. We lost that game 39-47 but played competitively with a limited roster, due to injury/concussion protocol. The team is currently traveling to NC to play Fayetteville Tech and Barton College JV teams.

Baseball and Softball are currently in off season conditioning and are working out regularly in the weight room under the supervision of our new Fitness Center Coordinator, Tyler Ackerman, who started on October 14<sup>th</sup>.

Golf currently has a healthy 9-man roster, the most we have had in many years! The team played in a fall scrimmage at Black Rock and are currently doing off season workouts with Coach Schultz.

# **Career Development, Internship and Job Services**

November is National Career Development Month and HCC's Career Development Week is being held November 11 - 15.

Twenty-six for-credit internship applications have been received for the Spring 2025 semester. This a slight increase over the 21 applications that were received for the Spring 2024 semester. All applications are currently under processing review.

Coordination efforts for planning the Spring 2025 Washington County Career Expo @ HCC have begun. In partnership with Washington County, Washington County Chamber of Commerce, and Washington County Public Schools, the College will be hosting a tradeshow style event that offering local organizations to showcase their organization and its employment and career pathways and opportunities to network with prospective employees. The event will target HCC students, area high school students, as well as, general jobseekers in the greater Hagerstown area. The event will also host HCC's Open House event. We anticipate at least 100 local employers and 500 jobseeker attendees, that will include 250 area high school students and 200 HCC students. The Career Expo and Open House @ HCC event will be held on Friday, March 28, 2025 from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. on campus in the ARCC.


Amanda Miller, Professor of English, is excited about a new experimental class ENG 221X, Literary Publication. This course is where the Hedge Apple literary magazine will be run. "This 200-level class is in line with how other local community colleges are running their student-led literary magazines. The English department hopes this course will also help HCC better recruit BISFA creative writers and possibly even work toward

developing a creative writing certificate. As of Tuesday, Oct 8th on the first day of registration, ENG-221X already has six students registered!"

**ENG-221X: Literary Publication** 

Literary Publication offers experienced writers and literary enthusiasts practical experience working on a team with other classmates, a graphic designer, an art director, a faculty advisor, Kindle Direct Publishing, and the HCC print department to produce an issue of the Hedge Apple literary magazine. As editors, they will work with a team to select which pieces deserve a place in the magazine and then edit those pieces for publication. This is an opportunity for students to hone skills in team building, accountability, and effective communication. Students will also learn about the current publication market, develop a statement of aesthetics, and submit their own creative work to other magazines. Before beginning this class, students should be able to discern inconsistencies in closed-form poetry and issues with plot, characterization, showing vs telling, dialogue, and point of view.

Cindy Blank, Professor of Biotechnology, would like to highlight a few of HCC graduates. Recently on LinkedIn, Kemp Proteins posted a picture of the Kemp Proteins Expression Team which features two of our HCC graduates Jedidiah Hill and Tyler Cook. "The expression team plays a pivotal role in producing high-quality recombinant proteins for Kemp..." Tyler Cook completed an internship at Kemp Proteins last Spring (2024). In addition to these two students, Cindy mentioned that there are an additional 4 HCC graduates working in different departments at Kemp Proteins.

# Workforce Solutions and Continuing Education

WSCE continues to award scholarships to workforce development students via MHEC's Workforce Development Sequence Scholarship, Rural Maryland Grant, the Radcliffe Foundation Grant and two Maryland Department of Labor EARN grants for construction and transportation.

- o Medical Assisting cohort began with 9 new students
- New Dental Hygiene Prescription writing course will begin in February only one other offering in the state, currently.
- Massage Therapy curriculum developer has been hired program anticipated start January 2026
- o Paramedic Site visit scheduled for November 14 15
- ELL Phlebotomy began with 4 students. ELL CNA begins on November 12<sup>th</sup> with 5 students
- CNA/GNA at High schools began Module 2 on October 28<sup>th</sup> with 6 students at Boonsboro and 7 students at Smithsburg. – all students were successful in Module 1; Students will begin clinical rotations after the new year.
- Working to move Foundations of Health Careers to hybrid format to reduce barriers for students.
- Working with Asian American Center of Frederick about the potential for a daytime Medical Assisting Contract Training. Working to add CNA/GNA Contract Training for AACF beginning in February or March 2025.
- Allied Health Commercial was filmed by Marketing team featuring current Phlebotomy and CNA students. This is scheduled to air on Antietam Cable and streaming platforms in December.

#### • Summer Youth Programs Formally College for Kids

- o Planning for the summer of 2025 has begun. We are looking to expand our offerings to host a limited number of first-grade classes next year.
- O Discovery Academy is expecting to expand program offerings again this summer while maintaining high-interest programs from recent years.
- Plans are underway to host a pre-camp kick-off event on campus on February 1, 2025, with opportunities for students to engage with current instructors and experience a portion of what Summer Youth Programs has to offer.
- Summer Youth programs will offer eight weeks of instruction this year during the summer.

#### • Personal Enrichment

- O Students from Personal Enrichment have shown immense interest in craftsman art as our newly developed stain glass class has filled with a waiting list. We have added this class to a regular rotation and want to expand offerings within this art area.
- New winter classes have been added and we are expanding our writing offerings for students currently.
