Changes to CDL training rules and laws over the last two years have created barriers for many municipalities and businesses in Colorado who wish to upskill their staff. In an effort to help with training needs and overcome training barriers, NJC is offering onsite CDL Class - A & Class - B training throughout Colorado.

Northeastern Diving College's Commercial Driving Program is prepared to provide customized training to City, County and State entities throughout Colorado, who are in need of upskilling or reskilling their employees with the Commercial Driver's License.

The 2023 Colorado Talent Pipeline Report identified Commercial Driver's License (CDL) as one of the top ten indemand certificates in Colorado. Recognizing this in-demand industry, NJC is expanding workforce noncredit, short term, programs to offer pathways to industry recognized credentials.

Customization will include vehicle type, location, duration and schedule. The custom class will meet or exceed all training requirements set forth by the FMCSA, the State of Colorado and the ELDT mandate for a Class - A and/or Class - B CDL.

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NJC CDL INFORMATION

NJC boasts a 100% success rate (CDL obtainment rate) for public employees who have completed their customized CDL course. Custom trainings are available for CDL Class - A or Class - B based on the employers needs.

 Affordability, Quality, Accountability, Resource Development and Operational Excellence

WalletHub released rankings of the best and worst community colleges, which were ultimately determined by the best education at the lowest price. NJC was one of only three from the entire state of Colorado to be ranked in the top half of the 653 community colleges that were evaluated. Among the three, NJC was ranked the highest for educational outcomes and in fact, we placed in the top 100 colleges in that category.

In response to the issues encountered last year and, in an attempt, to build a proactive approach to campus safety, NJC has employed work studies as after-hours Campus Safety and Grounds Monitors. There will be three work-studies working as a team to do a campus walkthroughs during the evening. These work-study students carry no authority as security officers and will not be expected or asked to place themselves in any situation that has a potential for conflict or danger. These students' jobs are simply to walk the campus, monitor activities, and report any safety or grounds maintenance concerns. Specific duties include monitoring for suspicious activity, locking doors, turning off lights, and ensuring buildings are empty after hours (especially classrooms and restrooms). They will also provide escorts to any students requesting someone to walk with them to a building or dorm. The aim of the program is to expand our awareness of campus life outside our core operating hours of 8-5.

To help fundraise for NJC Student Scholarships, the NJC Foundation is offering country dance lessons and practice opportunities for anyone interested.
