## Transform the student experience.

- The name for this section is *Transform the student experience*. For Trinidad State's Adult Education Services, we could easily name it *Transform Lives*. To date this semester there have been 10 graduates, 50+ students with at least one of the four GED tests passed, 11 former GED graduates enrolled Spring 2022 Trinidad State and 14 students have enrolled in Valley Campus Adult Ed as a result of the STEP Agreement with Alamosa High School (dropouts). Thank you, Director Tammie Mack. We are so proud of this program that changes lives.
- And here is another transforming lives story. Trinidad State had its first Second-Chance Pell graduate at Trinidad Correctional Facility this week. The student graduated Magna Cum Laude. GED graduates were celebrated in the ceremony as well. Colorado Department of Corrections' commitment to education is strong and Trinidad State Division Chair for Prison Education is honored to have been selected to participate in the Vera Institute of Justice Corrections Education Leadership Academy (CELA). question witnesses, dust for fingerprints, cast footprints, and look for gun-shot
residue. The event included a luminol demonstration, blood splatter

examples and students learned about bullet trajectory. Mr. Hart was assisted by members of the Las Animas County Sheriff's Office and Faculty member Sarah Sloane. Thank you, Criminal Justice program, for transforming the learning environment.



Let's call this one *Transforming opportunity* – Robotics Team advisor and Math Faculty member, Cynthia Clements shared another round of achievements for the Robotics Team. The Balloon Satellite team launched their balloon from Deer Trail on April 2<sup>nd</sup> and had a successful landing about four hours later. They are currently analyzing their data preparing for an upcoming presentation. The Robotics Team competed at the Sand Dunes on April 16th and won Best Robot under 1.5 kg and best demonstration in advanced autonomy (mapping). On April 23<sup>rd</sup> both the Robotics Team and the Wearables Team presented their research to NASA at the Colorado Space Grant Consortium's Research Symposium in Boulder. Both teams took home a prize in their respective categories. The teams had an added benefit at the Symposium of getting to hear the keynote speaker, Camille Arnn, a TSC robotics team alumni who has worked as a specialist flight controller in Mission Control at NASA's Johnson Space Center for the past 5 years. She recently left NASA to become the manager of all the program managers at Astrobotics who are currently developing several lunar landers which will be landing on the moon at the end of this year. Thank you, Cindy Clements, for opening doors of opportunity for our students.

- Carlos Oquita was named Region 9 Player-of-the-Week following a great offensive performance last weekend. Over the three-game set with Luna, Oquita hit .833, going 10 for 12 with 2 doubles, 2 home runs, 13 RBIs, 7 runs and 1 walk.
- NJCAA Men Ahmed Sado. It wasn't just three races in three days for Ahmed Sado it was three national-leading marks in three days at the Bryan Clay Invitations. His odyssey started on Wednesday in the steeplechase as he finished second in his section in 8:53.48, the fastest NJCAA time since 2011 and good for No. 6 all-time. Thursday came the 5000 and Sado covered 12 ½ laps in 14:08.43 which rates No. 4 on the NJCAA all-time list. Friday, he clocked 3:49.18 to register the fastest raw time by an NJCAA runner this year. The only mark "faster" this year is Sado's own 3:51.24 which is converted to 3:46.38 as having been run at high altitude. Sado also rates No. 2 on this year's 10,000 list. Sado is the second athlete male or female from Trinidad State to earn National Athlete of the Week honors in outdoor track & field, the first since 2017.
- Softball swept Otero last week to move to 13-9 in region play. TSC won by the scores of 11-6 and 12-4
- Coach Justin Wichert picked up his 100th career win as the Trojans topped Lamar 11-9. Congratulations Coach


