Members of Otero College's Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) academic honorary chapter held an induction for their new members on Feb. 28, 2022, and April 24, 2022

Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society was founded in 1918 to recognize and encourage the academic achievement of two-year college students and to provide opportunities for individual growth through honors, leadership, and service programs. PTK is the largest honor society in American higher education. It has inducted more than 3.5 million members and nearly 1,300 chapters in 50 United States, U.S. Territories, Canada, Germany, Peru, the British Virgin Islands, Palau, Micronesia, the Marshall Islands, and the United Arab Emirates. PTK is the only honors society for students attending two-year colleges.

The Delta Rho chapter at Otero College extends membership invitations to students who are currently enrolled at Otero College and have a 3.25 GPA.

On Tuesday, March 22, 2022, the Nation celebrated the agriculture industry with National Ag Day. The Otero Agriculture Department and Ag Club postponed the celebration due to the weather conditions. The celebration was rescheduled for Tuesday, March 29, 2022.

The day's events started with an all-day scavenger hunt for all things agriculture related on Otero campus. A free app, "GooseChase", was used to find the search labeled "Find the Needle in the Haystack"! The afternoon was filled with activities including ag themed minute-to-win-it games and petting zoo. These games included everything from dressing a goat, stacking hay, and making butter in a minute. There were chicks, goats, lambs, puppies, and a pony at the petting zoo.

Transform Our Own Workforce Experience

Otero College's Dr. Kimberly Munro was asked to speak at the Society for American Archaeology (SAA) Annual Meeting March 30 – April 3, 2022 in Chicago, Ill. Munro is the Faculty Professional Development and Student Research Coordinator under the AIM Grant. She also is a part-time faculty member and teaches Anthropology.

Munro presented two academic papers that she co-authored. The first, "Roads as Bridges: Assembling Communities and Borderlands over the Longue Duree in Western Ancash" by Kimberly Munro, David Chicoine, and George Lau, looks at the role prehistoric road networks played in connecting communities across space and time. The second paper, "Temples in Process Not Period: Reevaluating Narratives of Early Community Practice and Interaction across North-Central Peru" by Rebecca Bria, Kimberly Munro, and Matthew Piscitelli, discusses early religious architectural traditions in the Andes Mountains.

Dr. Munro also presented at the Formative Interactions in the Central Andes – Virtual Forum on Nov. 9, 2021, which was hosted by the Royal Ontario Museum, Vanderbilt University of Arts and Science and Anthropology. She is the founder and co-director of the District of Cáceres-Ancash Peru-Archaeological Project located in the upper Nepeña River Valley, Peru. She is also the Archaeologist of Record, working with Mark Korbitz, Otero Science Faculty member, at the Chacuaco Creek Field Project in southeast Colorado in Las Animas County.
