### **Transform the student experience**

<u>Cosmetology program back on campus</u> – After more than a decade operating off campus, PCC's cosmetology program is back on the grounds with a renovated space and new equipment. It was part of a \$6.3 million capital improvement project – funded by the Colorado General Assembly – that included renovation of PCC's Health Sciences building. The popular <u>cosmetology clinic</u> will reopen to the public this semester with discounted haircuts, manicures, facials and other services performed by students under instructor supervision.



<u>Southwest campus expands CTE opportunities</u> – Perry Pepper, director of academic services for PCC's Southwest campus, co-wrote an article for the Association for Career & Technical Education about efforts to make CTE more accessible to underrepresented students in the region. About half of the students in a new carpentry class were from the Ute Mountain Ute reservation and helped build a Habitat for Humanity home in Cortez.





OTA program collaborates with school district – PCC's Occupational Therapy Assistant program partnered with Widefield School District 3 during the spring semester to help students in Widefield's Transition Link Services program prepare to live independently. The trial run was so successful that another collaboration is planned for

the upcoming school year.
