Oral Health Career Center Grand Opening & Ribbon Cutting



Ominous storm clouds did not dampen the energy and excitement on July 16, when PPSC and the Delta Dental Colorado Foundation opened the state-of-the art Oral Health Career Center.

More than 150 guests gathered to celebrate this new facility, that will house the PPSC dental assisting program and its new dental hygiene program, set to begin in 2025.

Students will learn from industry experts, work with state-of-the-art equipment and upon graduation, enter the workforce. There they will help to lessen the severe shortage of dental hygienists and dental assistant

providers throughout Colorado. Faculty will also work closely with students to provide no, or low, cost dental clinics for up to 200 patients a week

This positive step forward for the region – and state – is possible because of the generosity of the Delta Dental of Colorado Foundation. The group provided PPSC its largest grant in the College's history.

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First Nation's Promise Program: Press Conference & Listening Session



PPSC launched its new Promise Program focused on Native American communities with both a community listening session and press conference. The First Nations Promise is a last-dollar grant initiative that covers direct costs like tuition and fees for members of federally recognized American Indian tribes residing in El Paso, Teller, or Elbert counties. First Nations Promise scholars will receive academic coaching and support during their time at PPSC.

The development of the First Nations Promise Program is a significant step forward in PPSC's commitment to inclusivity and education for Native Americans. According to the U.S. Census Bureau in 2022, nearly 30% of the Native Americans living in El Paso County lived below the poverty line and only about 50% graduated from high school. PPSC is committed to educational access that transforms lives and this program ensures Native Americans in Colorado Springs are actively invited to pursue and complete their academic and career interests.

The Dakota Foundation is committed to gifting \$50,000 per year for the next five years toward the initiative. This generous contribution is coupled with a \$250,000 commitment from the Daniels Fund, bringing the total funding to half a million dollars. Throughout the summer, PPSC was highlighted in several news stories because of its commitment to building positive partnerships within the community.


