The Spring '24 semester is well underway, and I'm excited to share some highlights of the wonderful work our faculty and staff have been engaged in:

Languages and Humanities Department

Dr. Evanda Watts-Martinez led robust programming in January and February in support of National Stalking Awareness and Domestic Violence Awareness Months. These initiatives bring attention to these important issues and impact our campus in meaningful ways.

Over the winter intersession Dr. Rachel Finney continued her tradition of traveling to Guatemala to volunteer her time in support of children receiving medical care. Dr. Finney has taken RBC students on this service trip in the past and we hope to support that experience again in the future.

Natural Sciences and Mathematics Department

Dr. Katie Bjorkman co-authored an article titled, "Illustrating Student Mathematics Identities Through a Network of Identity Frameworks" which was published in PRIMUS (Problems, Resources, and Issues in Mathematics Undergraduate Studies). This article was selected by the journal as an Editor's Choice for 2024 in the "New Authors" category and we are extremely proud of Dr. Bjorkman's scholarly work.

Social and Behavioral Sciences Department

Professor Michelle Delano continues to encourage her students to combine art with community engagement. This semester students are working on a mural for Crater Community Hospice (CCH) and an installation of 1Kind Thing into their thrift shops. As part of the project planning process, students will meet with the CEO and Board of Directors of CCH. This is a unique opportunity for

students to engage in experiential learning, while supporting our community and developing relevant skills for the future.

A Campus on the Move

University College

Dr. Ann Ifekwunigwe has scheduled several campus tours in support of our partnership with Transfer Scholars Network (TSN). Last week students traveled to Johns Hopkins University and tomorrow a small group will embark on a tour of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). Later in the spring she will escort students to an open house at UVA's School of Engineering as well as a trip to Virginia Wesleyan University in support of our Beacon Scholars program.

This experience will include attending a Broadway play, visiting Rockefeller Center, a trip to the Statue of Liberty, and much more. This year's service-learning trip will be to Savannah, Georgia. Students will participate in a beach cleanup, walking tours of historic Savannah, and a once in a lifetime tour of the University of Georgia Marine Education Center and Aquarium, including working in their laboratories.

Around Campus

February kicked off with the "Bland Bazaar" showcasing student clubs and activities. There are currently 18 active clubs and organizations, and this number continues to grow.
