- **The Rocky Mountain Line Tech Program Graduation** is both indoors for the ceremony and recognitions, and also outdoors for the *Line Tech Rodeo*, an opportunity for graduates to showcase their skills for employers. The program advisory committee also meets during this celebration day to discuss program needs, funding for students, and lessening barriers to student success. This semester 31 graduates were recognized. Congratulations, graduates!
- Division Chair and Criminal Justice faculty member, Sarah Sloane, brings **real and local-work experience into the classroom**. Early in November, City of Trinidad Police Department Detective, Jennifer Lay, gave a presentation to students about a homicide case she worked on a few years ago. The response from students was very positive, noting that they found the case compelling and learned the step-by-step investigation interesting.



- **The Trinidad Youth Mural Program** has finalized the 2022 Mural cycle. This mural is located at the “Waterworks” building site in down town Trinidad. There were seven full time students and multiple college art students were involved in the “Wander Through” mural which had a theme of natural and outdoor recreation. The full-time student artists each received a \$500 TSC scholarship. \$3500 was raised in total in collaboration with the TSC Educational Foundation. 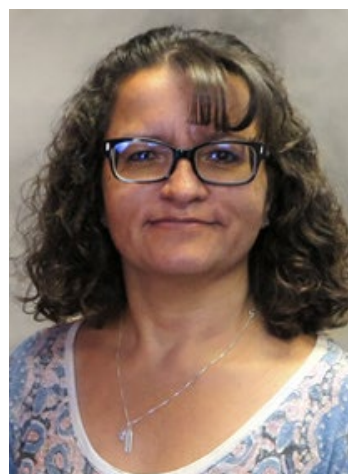
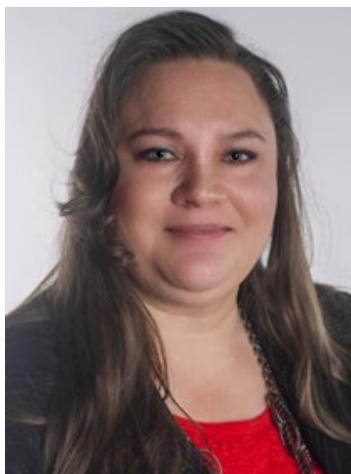

- As a Regional Workforce Board member and State Rural Consortium Board Member, Adult Education Services Director, Tammie Mack, worked with Dean Alfredo Burciaga and Recruiter, Morgan Wadleigh, to regain presence back in the local **Workforce Center One-stop Program** to build recruitment numbers and promote the college. Having an in-person presence at the Workforce Center helps the college to grow and to meet the in-demand local workforce needs.
- Trinidad State College is proud of this year's recipient of the **Teaching Equity Champion Award, LiAnn Richardson**. This award is in recognition of those who have demonstrated excellence in fostering classroom environments, implementing strategies that reduce or eliminate equity gaps in student success and constantly are improving their teaching practice to meet individual student needs. Through her work with the Colorado Department of Corrections Richardson (photo on left below) has developed competencies for student achievement, created and fostered a strong advisory board for the program, enlisted credentialed professionals to teach and mentor students, and supported ongoing training for alumni of the program as they exit the penal system. She is an outstanding recipient of this award.



- Trinidad State College is proud of this year's recipient of the **Excellence & Innovation in Student Affairs Award, Mathilda Westerman**. This award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated innovative excellence in Student Affairs programming. Innovative programs are those that use new ideas, methods, or techniques that result in improved educational or developmental activities, services, or management for a college community. Westerman (photo on right above) has worked tirelessly to ensure that every student she encounters receives the support they need to be successful. She is sensitive to their needs, whether it is basic student services, making a payment, or finding a resource such as food insecurities if needed. She is known as the go-to. She has recently been awarded a third-time staff member of the year which recognizes her efforts of sensitivity to Diversity Equity & inclusion of both staff and students. - **Jim Kynor, Valley Campus Vice President**, has recently been named to two boards in the San Luis Valley. The charters of both organizations tie very nicely with the affordable housing mission of the TSC Construction program. The two boards are:

The Rio Grande Community Trust (RGCT), incorporated in January 2022, is a community focused, non-profit Community Land Trust (CLT). The CLT model is a proven, practical, and efficient approach to affordability and can maintain the diverse character of the SLV. Our goal is to support long term San Luis Valley (SLV) community viability by securing affordable homeownership and accessible business opportunities for those of modest means.

Christian Community Service Projects (CCSP), CCSP guides the efforts of volunteers that come to the San Luis Valley from all parts of the United States to assist the elderly and those who may have a difficult time performing home repair projects. These volunteers have helped build access ramps, painted houses and completed many other projects to enhance the safety and comfort of those who have reached out to CCSP for assistance.



As a fundraiser, **Cross Country and Track Coach Kyle Masterson** took a run, but not just any run. He ran from the San Luis Valley to Trinidad. You see him here with Coach Lauren Masterson at about 7:00 am – after 20 hours of running. In his words ... *“Tomorrow morning at 11am I will take off from the Valley Campus and make the journey on foot to the Trinidad Campus to encourage your support in our 2022 Fund Raising Challenge for the Cross Country and Track teams. That's no typo. We could probably raise some funds for our young people by just asking for donations. However, to show how much these young folks deserve your support and mean to me I'm going to run from one of our campuses to the other. While you're having lunch tomorrow I'll be running. When you have dinner, I'll be running. When you go to bed, wake up in the middle of the night, and likely still when you wake up Saturday morning...I'll be running. - **Adult Education Services Director, Tammie Mack**, volunteers in the community and has recently judged the District FFA (Future Farmers of America) Creed Contest in Pritchett, CO.
- **The Visual Art Department has hosted four Artist Lectures** for the Fall 2022 series. We have expanded this programming to include national and state-based artists. We are

collaborating with the major galleries and museums in Trinidad via the First Friday showing schedule in order to increase community interest for these important visiting artists. We offer a virtual attendance option this semester and will continue to do so into the future. We have had an average of 24 people in attendance for each lecture: about 30% students, 20% staff/faculty, and 50% community members. 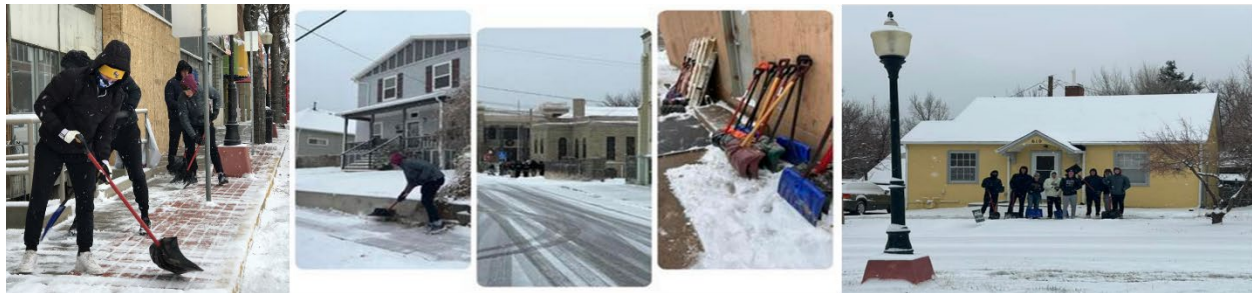
