

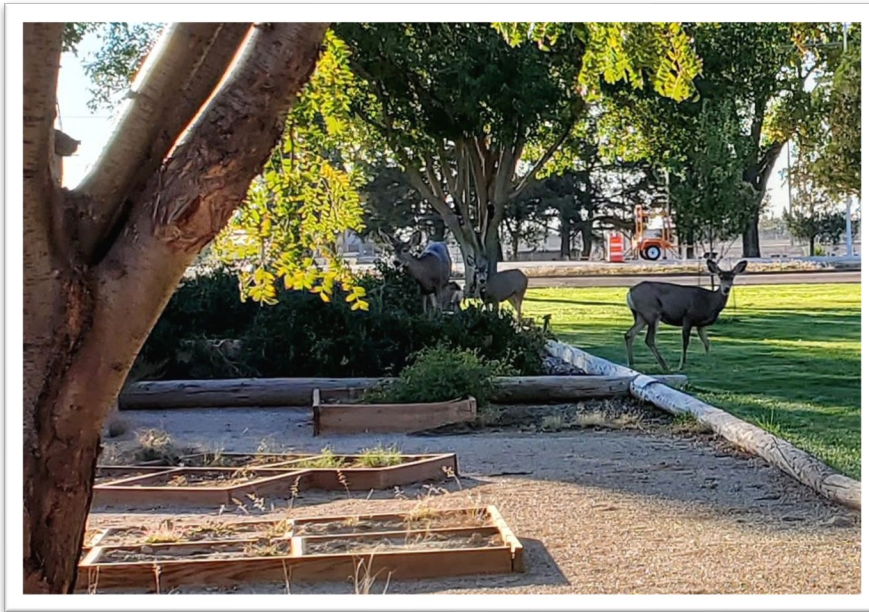


Lamar Community College President's Report November 2022

Visitors in the Learning Garden

LCC is home to students from many corners of the world, including those of the antlered variety. Our resident deer population has taken to enjoying the many vegetables and flowers in the learning garden much to the dismay of our groundkeeper, Kyle Kurtz. Due to the proximity of the nature walk and woodland area LCC is the primary source of nutritious foliage for the local deer, turkey, bobcat, bird, and duck population with at least two ducks calling the pond on campus their home. Students will often experience these sociable ducks waddling up to them from their pond in search of dropped snacks.



Tutoring Lab New Hours

LCC's Tutoring lab has undergone a change in coordination and Tayla Turner has taken measures to ensure that every student has the opportunity to receive assistance in their courses. Tayla has altered the hours of operation and staggered the tutoring hours so that each course subject is available in morning shifts and evening shifts so traditional and non-traditional students can access tutoring on their own schedule. She has also taken steps to ensure students know about *TutorMe*, which is online tutoring available 24/7.

NFL Day at the Salon

Each year, the LCC Salon celebrates the beginning of football season with an NFL themed party day. This year the Salon served finger foods and let clients draw prizes for discounts on haircuts, colors, and nail services. 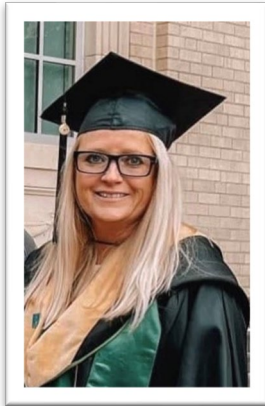


During the lunch break, the HTM/EBM Advisory Council meets to hear about the programs and to offer advice and ideas for improving the curriculum and student placements.

Welcome Amber Settles



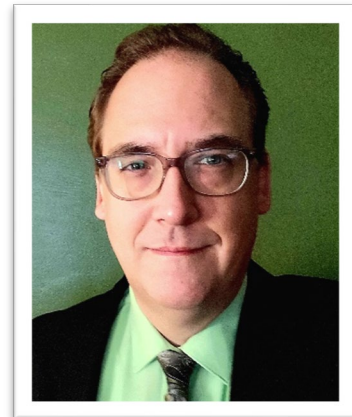

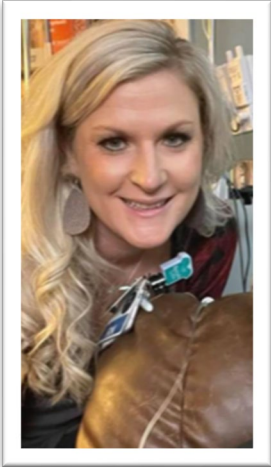


Welcome Brian Gauck



Brian joins the LCC team as the Agriculture Professor. Dr. Gauck's lifetime in agriculture and passion for leadership brought him to Lamar Community College. He is a native of Milan, Indiana and is the first educator from a family lineage of farmers. Growing up, he participated in FFA and was a 10-year 4-H Member. He earned a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Education from Purdue University; both specializing in Agriculture. He earned his Doctor of Philosophy in Education at Colorado State University, specializing in Organizational Learning, Performance, and Change. Dr. Gauck's experience includes five years as a regional Soil and Water Conservation Extension Specialist for Purdue University, adjunct instructor for Indiana Wesleyan University, and ten years as a high school instructor in Vocational Agriculture and Citizenship and Leadership Development. Dr. Gauck is a Navy

Veteran, having served as a helicopter pilot in Operations Provide Comfort Enduring Freedom. His military service brought him to North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) and United States Northern Command (USNORTHCOM) in Colorado Springs, where he worked in homeland security and defense before his retirement in 2013. Dr. Gauck is a member of the Association of Leadership Educators, a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association as a rodeo photographer, and other community service organizations. He also served as a volunteer coach for the Air Force Academy Rodeo Team. His interests include learning classical piano, supporting military charities, and our western heritage.

Strategic Planning – Action Priority Groups

As part of the 2020-2025 Strategic Plan, each year LCC focuses on one theme and engages the entire college in action priorities related to that theme. Year one was “aesthetics/amenities”, year two was “communication” and this year’s focus is “expanding access”. The President’s Leadership Council’s (PLC) and hoc planning group – Kelly Emick, Robert Vazquez, Kyle Lasley, Shealynn Robins, Jennifer Goodland, and Courtney Beshara – worked with PLC and Dr. Lujan to identify priorities for this year. In the longstanding tradition of process improvement from LCC’s many years as an Academic Quality Improvement Project (AQIP) campus, each employee will participate in one of the projects.

1. College-wide Priority Projects

1.1. Student Success Priority

Recommend updated schedule courses, programs, and services to fit the needs of the communities we serve. Look at hours of operation, course availability, services, etc. to see if we are meeting the needs of the students we want to serve.

1.2. Community Success Priority

Develop calendar, responsible parties, and processes, to successfully plan, coordinate, and offer meaningful campus events to bring community members, potential students, and others to LCC throughout the year. Examples include Career Fairs, Knowledge Bowl, Girls in the Middle, FFA Conference, Transfer Fairs, Colorado History Day, etc.

1.3. Resource Success Priority

Increase recruitment activities and strategies for enrollment growth in all categories of students, including adult learners.

1.4. Employee Success Priority

Work with employees and the Employee Engagement Committee to expand opportunities for employees to support campus events and activities (including athletic events), increase wellness activities, and engage with each other.

In addition to college-wide projects each department and unit may have its own action priorities and projects related to expanding access (removing barriers).

Presidential Search Finalist Campus Visits

The first of November brought excitement and bit of sadness to campus. Dr. Linda Lujan will be retiring from her position as President and a candidate has been chosen to succeed her. Although we are very fond of Dr. Lujan and all her accomplishments at LCC, we understand that her desire to spend time with family and enjoy the fruits of her labor. Lamar Community College hosted the three presidential search finalists. During their visit, each candidate was given a tour of campus and the surrounding town and booked up with several meetings with important staff and student groups to get a better understanding of what LCC is all about. Their day ended with a public forum in which the community members were invited to ask questions and give feedback to Chancellor Garcia on this important decision. Ultimately, we are excited to report that a candidate was chosen and has accepted the position to begin shortly following the new year.

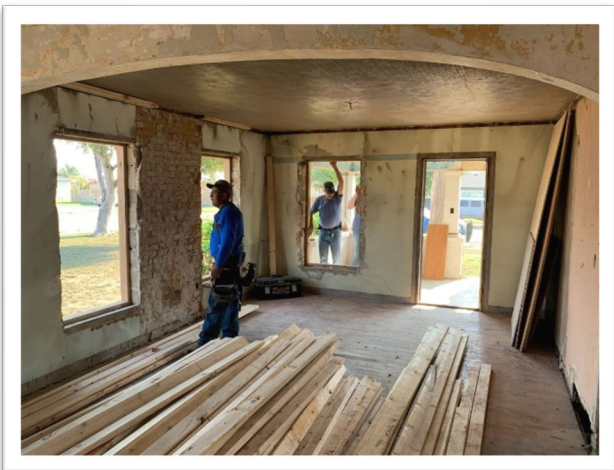
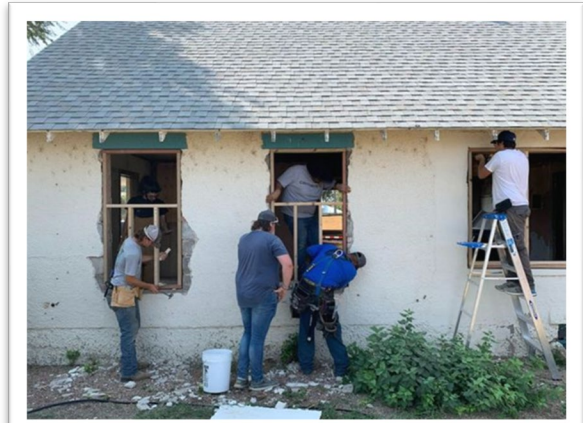
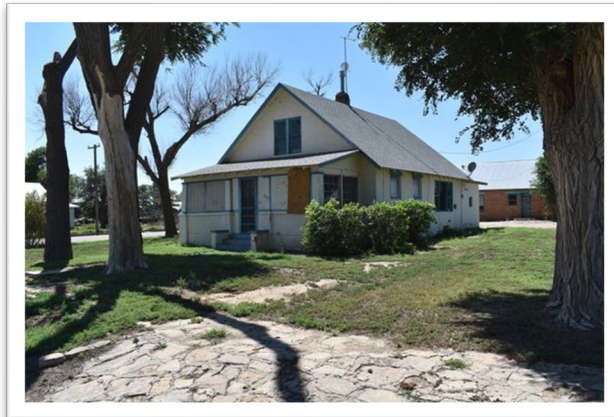
Men’s Basketball Service Project

COPERR Project

LCC's Construction Trades program, which renovated and sold its first home last year, is renovating another home in Wiley this year as part of the COPERR project, funded through the Attorney General's Office. Students are learning about every aspect of renovation as they demo and rebuild key components. Recently, a donor offered a vacant lot in Lamar, so the next project will be a new build, which we're told will go much faster than a renovation.



ACT Testing

Lamar Community College serves as a testing site for the ACT testing in Colorado. High school students can sign up to test from all over Colorado and even some parts of Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas due to proximity. Linda Freiberger, LCC's testing coordinator, hosted the Fall ACT Testing date on October 22nd and had hosted students from our local schools.

Ag Olympics

LCC hosted Ag Olympics this year in October in our Equine Complex arena. Ag Olympics is a social and networking event for LCC students in the equine, rodeo and agriculture programs and is open to the community. Students from each of these programs will compete in Olympic style events of agility, strength and grace with an agricultural flare. Hay bale relays, manure cart obstacle course, ribbon roping and goat tying are just a few of the events that can be witnessed. This is a rather informal event that takes place to bring together the instructors, students, and community members to exchange ideas, share stories and build lasting relationships that will carry

FFA Creed Speaking Invitational and Ag Day

Lamar Community College hosted this event in early November and the campus was abuzz with hundreds of high school students from our surrounding communities. This event is designed to educate and illuminate growing agricultural concerns, help students make connections with local farmers, ranchers and specialists in their field, and offer students an opportunity to see what LCC can offer them for their post-secondary education. Students who did not participate in Creed contests and presentations learned about the many programs that LCC offers. In addition to learning about Precision Ag, Horse Training Management and Equine Business Management, students also heard from faculty and chairs about all the other programs at LCC.





Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative – Ethics Orientation

The prestigious Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative Collegiate Program at UCCS College of Business fellowships are awarded to UCCS educators who demonstrate excellence in pedagogical activities related to applied business, professional and organizational ethics. Lamar Community College is proud to be a part of this initiative and have nominated Student Life Coordinator Yolanda Herrera and English Faculty Dr. Zachary Sands as our 2022-2023 Ethics Champions. Representative Tracy Gonzalez Padron initiated our champions and provided an ethics orientation. During her visit to campus, Tracy provided an ethics seminar to our Student Government which included Ethical Leadership, Business Ethics, creating a personal code and how to become a role model for ethical behavior.

This October, students from LCC were invited to compete in the Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative Case Study Competition at the University of Colorado in Colorado Springs. Students Mason Mireles and Genesis Santiago were given a case study and had to prepare and present potential ethical solutions to a hypothetical board of directors. This was the first time that representatives from LCC had taken part in the competition, and though they did not place the experience they take away from this event will stay with them.



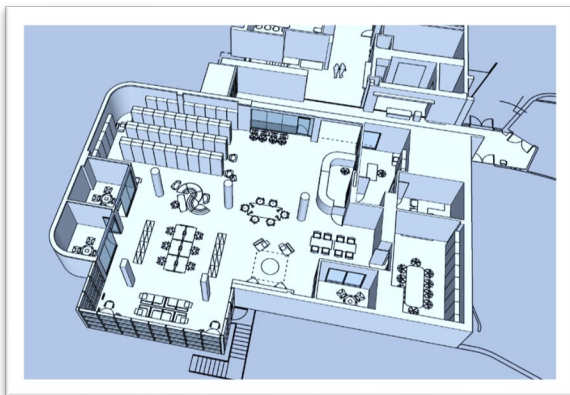
Redefine our value proposition through accessibility, affordability, quality, accountability, resource development, and operational excellence.

IREPO Committee Update

The technology purchased with the federal IREPO grant should be installed and completed by mid-November. The IREPO coordinator and IT department participated in a training with Samsung and feel the best course of action for implementing the new technology would be to do individual training with staff and faculty on its usage as each instructor has unique needs. From this basic instruction, each department can create training based on the feedback from instructors. Along with the install of technology and training, new logo-branded lecterns have been introduced into the classrooms to compliment the new furniture for a crisp and modern feel.



Camera systems are still a work in progress as the IREPO and IT departments research the best fit for LCC and for faculty usage and coordinate with the technology from the Rural College Consortium. For classrooms, there seems to be some consensus that 2 cameras would be appropriate, whereas many of the trades and nursing would benefit from having additional cameras, up to four or more. Each set up gives approximately 16 presets that would accommodate multiple teachers in each classroom.



Library Renovation Project

As part of a state-funded capital improvement project, LCC is working with Hall Architects to renovate the Bowman Library and Tutoring Lab. This renovation will completely redefine the two spaces and create additional private study rooms as well as an archival storage and work room for the library staff. Hall Architects held an open forum in the Large Lecture Hall of LCC in October and displayed boards of designs, versatile furniture options and study booths. When asking for feedback, some attendees voiced both praise and offered ideas, concerns, and suggestions for some of the design

elements and how they would fit with the college mission and space.

Boots, Bling & Blessings

The weather on October 22 was glorious, the venue was sparkling, the food was amazing, and the crowd was delighted to enjoy this year's Boots, Bling & Blessings signature fundraising event. In addition to a silent auction, which featured all the usual categories of gifts and baskets as well as a few unusual items, like stud fees and a darling mini-Australian Shepherd puppy, there were some fun fundraising games. The number of sponsors continue to grow and the LCC Foundation board actively engages in planning and hosting the event. Among the evening's highlights is the "speechifying" portion where Dr. Lujan introduces scholarship recipients, who each spend a moment talking about themselves and thanking donors.
