


President's Report: Dr. Michele Haney October/November 2022


First-Generation Celebration on Tuesday, November 8th. FYI nationally the



There is a new campus feature taking shape outside behind the Rec Center at RRCC. It is an educational rock garden, comprised (so far) of eleven boulders with interesting geologic features to use in teaching geology to students and the public. Many universities have similar installations, which are sites for both learning and gathering, but it is unusual for a community college to have one. Making this happen has been a personal goal for **Dr. Eleanor Camann** since she first started working at RRCC 15 years ago; it is finally coming to fruition. The project was approved pre-pandemic, but was delayed until about a year ago, when donations and purchases started arriving. Highlights include molybdenite from the Climax Molybdenum Mine donated by Henderson

Operations, Yule Marble (the official state rock of Colorado) donated by Colorado Stone Quarries, gold ore from the Cresson Mine in Victor donated by Newmont Mining, and other notable igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic rocks. A couple of the boulders double as benches, where you may sit and relax and enjoy our beautiful campus. Many thanks to **Kevin Edwardson** and his crew for the boulder placement and landscaping. Dr. Camann is working on some interpretive signs about campus geology, including one about the rock garden, so look for those in the future.
