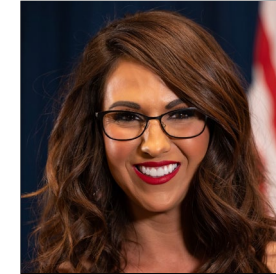

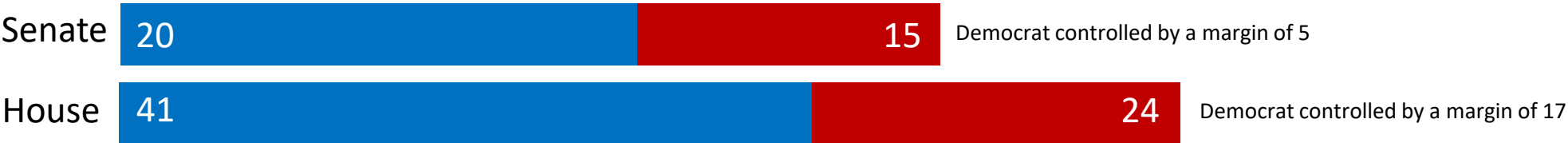

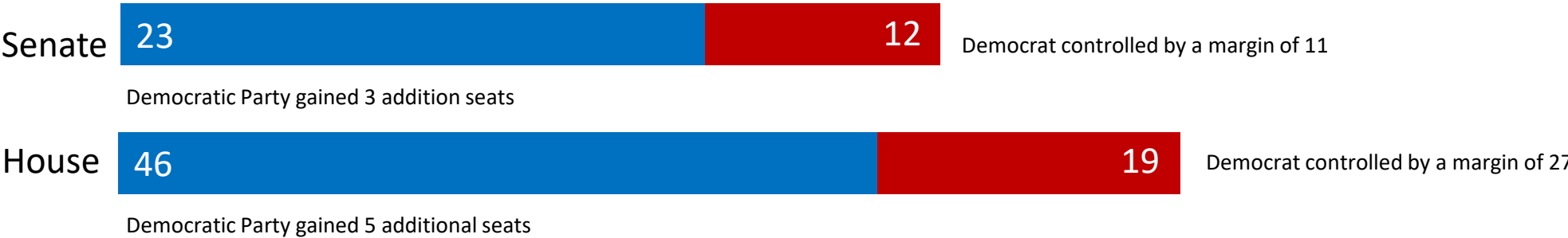
Colorado General Assembly

The Colorado General Assembly is made up of 100 members, 35 Senators and 65 Representatives. **Democrats gained additional seats in both the Senate and House for the 74th General Assembly.**

State Senate – Key Races

The Colorado State Senate had 17 seats up for election this cycle as Senators terms are four years, the remaining 18 seats will be up in 2024. Of the 17 seats up this cycle for the State Senate, 6 were won by Republicans and 11 were won by Democrats. Democrats picked up three seats, resulting in a 23 to 12 majority over Republicans in the State Senate, just one seat shy of a super majority. The following races were deemed competitive:
