Citizen brought initiatives are denoted by numbers and legislature-initiated proposals are denoted by letters. Amendments to the Colorado Constitution are denoted as Amendments and statutory changes are denoted as Propositions.

Under provisions in the state constitution, passage of a constitutional amendment requires at least 55 percent of the votes cast.

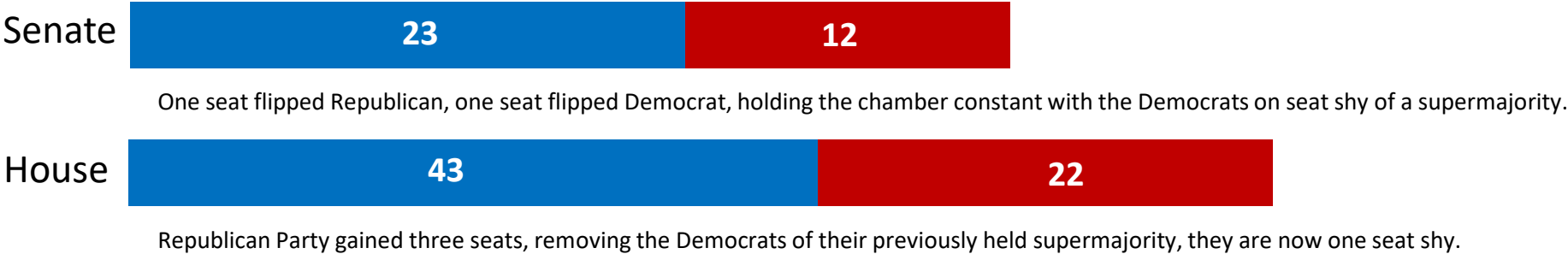
Colorado General Assembly

Expected Vacancies

Senator Kevin Van Winkle (R) who holds SD 30 has just won his election on Nov. 8th for Douglas County Commissioner. We expect him to resign his Senate seat in early January. Senator Chris Hansen (D) who holds SD 31 has announced that he's accepted a job and will be resigning from the legislature January 9th. Senator Janet Buckner (D), SD 29, also announced her resignation in November to be effective January 9th, the day after being sworn in. Each seat will require vacancy committees to be formed to fill the seats, leaving uncertainty on who will fill SD 30, SD 31, and SD 29 for the remainder of the 2025 Legislative Session.
