Highlighted Student Assembly Initiatives for Spring 2023

Undocually Training for New Student Orientation Staff

Student Assembly is working with the Office of Student Transition Engagement Programs to provide UndocuAlly training in order to ensure that our Orientation staff is equipped to provide this unique student population. We are partnering with W&M Fighting for Immigrant Rights and Equity (WMFIRE), a student population, to facilitate these training sessions. Some topics covered include, being a good ally and supporter, what to do if U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement is present on campus, and the use of more inclusive language and topics.

Bilingual Admissions Tours & University Resources

We recognize that the sense of belonging for members of the William & Mary community can begin during the college search process. To make non-English speaking supporters of prospective students feel more included during the college search process, we are advocating for bilingual tours and more accessible resources. We plan on working with the Office of Undergraduate Admissions to start this program during high-density visit days, such as Day For Admitted Students (DFAS) and Fall Focus days. Student Assembly strongly believes that all University events, programming, resources, and materials should be made accessible to our diverse populations.

Subsidized Transportation for Off-Campus Medical Appointments

In an effort to increase accessibility and remove financial barriers for students to attend off-campus medical appointments, we are working with stakeholders to help reduce costs for students. This initiative serves as a part of a larger conversation to best support low-income students. We believe that every step must be taken to ensure an equitable experience for all students.

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Student Support for the National Pan-Hellenic Council Garden

Student Assembly is excited to be working with the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), campus partners in Student Affairs, and University Advancement to explore increasing support and funding for the NPHC Garden. We urge University partners to put this project at the forefront of fundraising efforts and discussions.
