It is important that you first understand where I come from, and what has led me to be where I am now. I had immigrated to the United States when I was only three years old with my mother, who at the time was sixteen years old. Being raised in an unsafe household further emboldened my passion towards school, a place where I was seen and felt safe. This experience has shaped the many personal identities of myself that have endured physical and emotional adversity. Within my entire family, I am the only one that did not become a teenage mother before the age of 18 and has also graduated high school, and I will be the first to graduate college with a Bachelor's Degree. The moments of adversity throughout my life have inspired me to keep going, all while trying to navigate my academics and doing my best to help others.

Our academic system was designed to disenfranchise people like me, a young woman of color, who only want to achieve success in higher education and work towards a better life. Against all odds, I have overcome these hurdles meant to put women like me down, and I am now double majoring in Political Science & International Relations at Sacramento State University. With the help of the mentors, colleagues, and educators whom I have met with every step along my own educational journey, they have taught me to help others who are also struggling with their own journeys. By empowering them and fighting for their causes, I have become a voice for the voiceless. I am undocumented and proud, something I would not have even thought about having the courage to say publicly years before.

If given the opportunity to serve as the next CSSA Vice President of Systemwide Affairs, I will bring valuable experience to the position, given that I have served in student government since elementary school, as well as most recently serving as the ASI Vice President of University Affairs for Sac State. I understand the CSU system is crucial when wanting to see and enact change. I am honored and grateful for the opportunity to run, but as a person, I would like to do more for all college students throughout the CSU system. It is more likely for students to not ask for help if they are first generation, person of color, undocumented, or an international student.

Attending any of the California State Universities should feel that they belong in their campus, because that'll help them want to reach out for help and get more involved on their campus.

An issue affecting CSU students is the sense of belonging and a lack of information on campus resources. More so, having equitable opportunities and resources. The information is at the universities, yet not all students know this information because they attend their classes and leave. Over the years, we have seen how inclusive all campuses have become, yet each one has different systematic barriers. I started as a student attending the seminar that our Dreamer Resource Center offers. Through different DRC roles, I was able to understand the differences of the various support programs on campus. While I understand the reasons why the EOP or the CAMP receive more funding than the cultural and inclusive centers, I have been able to talk to peers about these differences, and why their funding only remains dependent on grants or state funding. A high number of all students work part time or multiple jobs, and aside from wanting to pursue a higher education, we also have bills to pay. In some cases, students drop out due to not being able to handle working and going to college. Across all campuses, students are struggling to receive mental health counseling. Students wait months in order to meet with someone. As Vice President of University Affairs for Sacramento State, I have worked on various levels to make sure students are heard and represented. In my role, I have met with students to get them involved in serving on committees internally and university wide because representation and student perspective matters. I've collaborated with campus partners to host events regarding mental health, sexual assault awareness, advocacy, and safety. My goal as a serving CSSA executive officer will be to expand my knowledge of all CSU campuses issues and take action. I am a voice for all students because we are all humans at the end of the day.
