Suzannah Moran, **Professor of Geography** recently had her World Regional Geography, GEO 105, course QM certified.

Tom Crawford, Professor of Mathematics attended The American Mathematical Association of Two-Year Colleges (AMMATYC) annual conference in Atlanta, GA from Nov 13 - 16, 2024.

His Statistical Reasoning, MAT 116, was received QM certification. Lastly, his Quantitative Reasoning, MAT 115, just went to external QM review for certification.

Stacey McGee, Associate Professor of Business and Accounting attended a webinar ' *Balancing Bots and Balance Sheets: Infusing AI with Humanity in Accounting Education*' . Instead of viewing AI as a threat, the webinar looked at ways to utilize AI as a tool to augment human skills and values. Information that can be used in future teaching.

Ed Sigler, Associate Professor of Engineering, worked with JLG and they are donating in January \$6000 towards the purchase of 15 Lego Robot kits for the HCC Engineering program.

Gina Yurek, Assistant Professor of Nursing, and the nursing faculty are very proud of our HCC nursing students. The current graduating class has a 100% pass rate on the Comprehensive Predictor for ATI. This exam tells faculty how likely our graduates are to pass their licensing exam, NCLEX. This is the first graduating class that has done this.

Megan Dayhoff, Associate Professor of Medical Imaging Programs,

- She attended the annual Excellence in Education Conference, sponsored by our program's accrediting agency the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology (JRCERT) in Chicago from Nov 11-13, 2024. The conference took a deep dive into accreditation standards and had presentations from the CEO of the American Society of Radiologic Technologists and the CEO of the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (our profession's national credentialing body). The conference was awesome!
- In the past year, the Medical Imaging program has added 4 new clinical affiliates:
 - Jefferson Medical Center,
 - WellSpan Chambersburg Urgent Care,
 - WellSpan Chambersburg Orthopedic Group
 - Himelfarb Surgical Center
- The Rad programs is also in process with our accrediting agency reviewing documents to approve Fulton County Medical Center as an affiliate as well. A decision is anticipated for this month.
- The Rad program is increasing the cohort size to 32 students accepted annually (this is a two-student increase over cohort sizes of the last 5 years). The next cohort of students (class of 2027) will be 32 students.
- Megan is working on developing curriculum relating to the use of medical imaging in the operating room environment.
 - The Rad program may receive some grant funds for the purchase of some new equipment to enhance this curriculum.
 - The hope is to have curriculum developed and implementation by FA25.

Jane Choi-Doan, Associate Professor of Environmental Studies/Life Sciences, took the Environmental students on a visit to the Conococheague Wastewater Treatment Plant a few weeks ago. Students fully experienced the rapid biological processes needed to clean the water to re-enter the watershed. Pictures of the field trip are provided below and on Facebook.

Doug Leisher, Assistant Professor of Information Systems Technology, was invited by the local IT company, Tech Team Solutions, to their luncheon. The founding members of this company and several of their employees are HCC graduates from our Network Administration and Cyber Security programs. This company is very receptive in having HCC interns work for them and have hired some of these interns.

Workforce Solutions and Continuing Education

- WSCE continues to award scholarships to workforce development students via several different grants including:
 - MHEC's Workforce Development Sequence Scholarship funded 43 students for a total of \$21,464
 - Rural Maryland Grant funded 80 students for a total of \$72,780
 - The Radcliffe Foundation Grant funded 8 students including 7 HCC incubator clients for an Entrepreneurship program for a total of \$8903
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- WSCE Allied Health
 - Winter CNA/GNA is waitlisting (30 applications) Working with Asian American Center of Frederick (AACF) to sponsor a second cohort beginning in March to sponsor waitlisted students.
 - New Dental Hygiene Prescription writing course will begin in February the class is currently full with 30/30 students registered. Additional offerings have been added for Spring 2025
 - Massage Therapy curriculum developer is currently working on course descriptions and textbook selections. Anticipated start date is January 2026
 - Washington County DES Paramedic program agreement is being updated to meet the requirements for accreditation.
 - o CNA/GNA at High schools begin clinical rotations January 13th
 - Asian American Center of Frederick to create a hybrid Medical Assisting contract training set to begin in March.

• Summer Youth Programs Formally College for Kids

- The Summer Program VIP kickoff event is scheduled for February 1, 2025, with an inclement weather date the following Saturday. A few summer teachers will be onsite to provide a glimpse of class offerings this summer. This event allows students and parents to register before the general registration opens.
- Our Summer Youth Program registration will open on February 12, 2025, with 80 camps for students in grades 1st-12th grade.

• Payment plans will be offered again this year for parents to assist in offsetting upfront costs and provide more opportunities for various financial demographic families to participate.

• Personal Enrichment

- Students from Personal Enrichment are taking advantage of partnership classes with CCBC and cross-listings with credit classes.
- Our homesteading classes will expand with Chicken-ology. The instructor with 20-plus years' experience and professional inspector training will be on campus to assist students in effectively starting their flock.
- This winter offers a new opportunity for Personal Enrichment students to learn current podcast communication trends. This is a resource they can build a hobby from or add to their business marketing portfolio.

• Business, Certification and Licensure:

- Partnering with the Professional Childcare Association of Washington County to offer space for their monthly training.
- Started the process of developing a Pet Grooming for Pet Owners series as well as a Pet CPR course.
- Partnering with Baltimore City Parks and Recreation to offer a Management Bootcamp series on campus for their new supervisors.
- On January 31 we will be offering a student leadership training day for HCC students involved in campus clubs. This has been initiated by the Student Activities department and Heather Barnhart.
- HCC received a grant offer A Nonprofit Symposium. This event, in partnership with the United Way, is being planned for May 2.

• Transportation/Trades/Tech

- Attended the annual Gatekeepers returning citizens ceremony on December 7 where Dr. Klauber was given an award for prison education efforts.
- Washington County Emergency Services has scheduled their first firefighter for CDL training; additional CDL started for other Washington County agencies.
- Began work with the Maryland Recreation and Parks Association to develop a 2025 spring schedule for training employees across that state on heavy equipment operation safety.
- Hired a new construction trades instructor to begin offering preapprenticeship classes at the Bowman Family Workforce Training Center in April; students would then feed into Registered Apprenticeship in the Barr Construction Institute.
- Winter welding classes are full and a renovation project is creating more efficient access to class materials and more storage for equipment.
