
Northeastern held a Preview Day on February 19 for perspective students. Thirty-one prospective students and forty family members attended the day's event.





The NJC Fire Science, EMS, and Nursing students conducted a Mass Casualty Incident Drill on campus on March 5. A simulated lightning strike at the baseball field produced trauma and burn victims, as well as those physically uninjured but with severe stress and anxiety. The Fire/EMS students provided basic medical care and transported the students to the NJC Nursing Lab where the student nurses conducted triage and care for the victims. The cosmetology department provided the realistic makeup to simulate the burns on the victims as seen in the photo. The Sterling Fire Department, Air Rescue from Haxtun and Sterling, and physicians from the Sterling Regional Medical Center also participated in the event.

Education Without Barriers Through Transformational Partnerships

Northeastern Junior College was thrilled to host the 2024 Colorado Regional Assessment Conference on February 16. It was a momentous occasion for educational assessment in the state, bringing together more than 70 faculty and staff from Colorado's higher educational institutions. Keynote speeches included Pepperdine University's Dr. Jennifer Miyake-Trapp and Terrence Cao, who discussed the need for educators and instructional designers to collaborate, and Dr. Kris Acheson-Clair from Purdue University, who shared insights from specific case studies that have built intercultural competence

development and global learning. University of Northern Colorado faculty Randy Larkins and Chad BeBee shared methods for gauging student learning with a focus on how to build successful program outcomes. Dr. Geeta Verma of the University of Colorado-Denver presented on LivedX, an AI-powered platform that converts real-life experiences into academic credentials. Dr. Michael Schulman of the Colorado Community College System presented innovative results from his retention research. Red Rocks Community College's Derek Grubb and Pikes Peak State College's Brook Koltun both offered valuable perspectives on evaluation techniques in advising and student services and how to incorporate the Council for the Advancement of Standards into educational assessment. The conference was organized by Leslie Weinsheim, Director of Institutional Research at NJC. Weinsheim and Dr. Matt Garcia of Red Rocks Community College shared experiences building an Honors Program and a First Year Experience Program, respectively. Dr. Veronica Koehn, NJC's Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences, presented on the expedient journey faculty have taken to develop institution-wide student learning outcomes that thoroughly encompass and embody the robust liberal arts, sciences, and career-technical education NJC provides. By creating a platform for institutions and educators to work together, the 2024 Colorado Regional Assessment Conference has raised the bar for academic innovation and excellence, creating a dynamic setting for sharing best practices and advancing comprehensive educational assessments and student learning strategies.



Just over a year ago, Northeastern Junior College approached the artists at the Sterling Correctional Facility to support a program to bring exciting artwork to the campus. Through a grant, NJC purchased supplies and large canvasses, and the artists created over 60 large paintings in celebration of heritage months. The paintings celebrate Hispanic Heritage, Native American Heritage, Black History, Women's History, Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage, holidays around the world and more. Many have been rotated between buildings for the enjoyment and appreciation of all. Today, the program continues with smaller paintings that are proudly displayed in offices and smaller rooms on campus with over 100 total paintings to date. The artists are given a theme with each set of canvasses and use their imagination and talent to design the paintings. Most recently, they produced artwork in support of mental health and athletics, and pieces reflective of the community including livestock and rural scenes. Most recently, the artists were asked to bring history to life with some historical figures.

• Affordability, Quality, Accountability, Resource Development and Operational Excellence

NJC received an Open Educational Resources Grant, which assists faculty with finding free alternatives to textbooks.

NJC received a \$200K Teaching Excellence Grant split with Morgan Community College. Faculty have been encouraged to find professional development opportunities. Part of that includes working with a consulting group called Neovate, which will help us identify places where we excel and where we can improve.

NJC was awarded a \$100,000 Wildfire mitigation grant to integrate that training into our Fire Science program.

NJC received an \$875,000 Behavioral Health Grant to build our Psychology Program.

NJC is working with LivedX, which is an online platform that helps students translate lived experiences into college credit to offer in B-term.

NJC has started an Ag Operations Certificate for the Diesel Program. There has been a lot of interest from other various industry companies.

NJC's Applied Technology Campus is looking at a CAD online course for Wind and Welding for Fall 2024.

NJC will be offering a Barbering Program through Cosmetology starting hopefully in the August term.

Northeastern held Hoops Homecoming on Saturday, February 10. The day included an Alumni Awards Luncheon, campus tours, followed by Women's and Men's Basketball Games versus McCook, NE. A reception was held for alumni, families and friends of NJC in the balcony of the Bank of Colorado Event Center.
