New Micro-Credential Behavioral Health Pathways

Lamar Community College (LCC) is launching five innovative "micro-credential" pathways this fall in response to the increasing demand for skilled behavioral health professionals. These pathways provide fundamental skills in mental health and substance misuse treatment, addressing the critical need for qualified workers in the field.

Designed to be completed in a single semester or less, the micro-credential programs offer targeted skill sets aligned with job market needs. They provide a seamless progression toward additional certifications and professional development opportunities. Students earning a micro-credential in behavioral health will gain foundational skills to start working in their community and earn college credit for further professional training.

The initiative, led by Academic Dean Kyle Lasley, aims to offer immediate career advancement. Microcredentials are stackable, leading to an associate degree and beyond. The programs have been developed in collaboration with the Colorado Community College System (CCCS), Education Design Lab, and the Colorado Behavioral Health Administration (BHA), ensuring they meet industry standards.

Amber Settles, LCC's Behavioral Health faculty member, is excited about the launch and its potential impact on rural communities. The programs, funded in part by a \$15 million grant secured through Senate Bill 22-181, aim to address the mental health and substance use challenges faced by one in five Coloradans.

The micro-credential pathways at LCC this fall include:

- 1. Qualified Behavioral Health Assistant I (10 Credit Hours): Entry-level behavioral health knowledge and competencies needed to become an effective practitioner.
- 2. Behavioral Health Assistant II (16 Credit Hours): Builds on QBHA-I through service-learning and a deeper understanding of diversity in behavioral health care.
- 3. Behavioral Health + (6 Credit Hours): Adds foundational behavioral health knowledge and crisis management skills applicable to various roles.
- 4. Patient Navigator (12 Credit Hours): Develops navigation skills within behavioral healthcare services and systems.
- 5. Addiction Recovery Assistant (20 Credit Hours): Focuses on addiction treatment and recovery support positions.

These programs align with Colorado's efforts to expand training in behavioral health. LCC will offer courses through online, in-person, and hybrid formats to cater to diverse learner needs. Prospective students and community members can contact LCC's admissions department for more information.
