## **TEACHING**

- From fall 2017 to spring 2023 taught 7 different courses (18 sections) in French
  and Francophone Studies. Courses included a COLL 100 (Real and Unreal Cities, a
  transatlantic course that includes Virginia Woolf's Mrs. Dalloway and Herman Melville's
  Bartleby, the Scrivener) and upper-level courses on topics such as Imagining Happiness,
  Audio-Vision in the Modern Era, and Bohemians to Avant-Gardes and Beyond. Contributed

  25 students.

- His major research contribution, the recently published book, *Kaleidophonic Modernity: Transatlantic Sound, Technology, and Literature,* is an original and interdisciplinary study of sound and visual culture in nineteenth-century aesthetics.
- Since arriving at W&M, Professor Brehm has also published two articles, with a third
  appearing before he arrived. He has three additional articles in progress, and plans for new
  projects, including a critical biography of Nina de Villard, a neglected figure who, alongside
  her partner Charles Cros, was a focus of significant archival research by Professor Brehm.
  Professor Brehm gives about one talk a year.
- Reviewer comments: All six external reviewers praise his scholarship, noting his intellectual

range (he has degrees in English, Art History and Comparative Literature, and has also studied jazz and music technology), his creativity, and the significance of his work. One calls his scholarship "impressive," another says Kaleidophonic Modernity is a "terrific book," and a third calls it a "tour de force."

  Qualcomm

- At W&M, has taught 11 sections of 4 different semester-long courses and 1 single-credit "pre-course" for the DC Summer Institute.

 Since arriving at W&M, Dr. Vierthaler has published 7 peer-reviewed articles, 2 non-peer reviewed articles, and a draft book manuscript. In addition he has made 49 digital humanities tutorial videos on YouTube, which have been reviewed tens of thousands of times.

- His book manuscript, Quasi-history and the Borders of Fiction in Late Imperial China, revises and expands upon his dissertation (with 2 entirely new chapters), and he has recently received a revise-and-resubmit report from Columbia University Press.
- Received a grant from William & Mary's Faculty Grant Fund to develop a pilot workshop on East Asian digital humanities as part of the University of Pennsylvania's DreamLab series.
- Reviewer comment: a "leading" scholar whose work "will help pave the way for the next generation of scholars who want to use computational methods to study classical Chinese sources."

## **TEACHING**

- Taught four different courses since fall of 2021 and directed 4 honors theses.
- Since arriving at William & Mary, Dr. Zvobgo has invested heavily in developing the International Justice Lab (IJL), which provides her a forum and a platform for mentoring student researchers. The opportunities and experiences students enjoy in the lab are second to none. In short, the lab is not simply a place where students join and perform more-or-less rote or repetitive tasks that are relatively easy to learn and complete over the course of a semester. Rather, Prof. Zvobgo does a tremendous amount of teaching in the IJL by training students in the particular methods of social science research that are salient to the lab's projects.

Published 8 peer-reviewed journal articles (5 of them co-authored), with an additional 4 coauthored articles forthcoming. She also has published 5 co-authored peerreviewed pieces on pedagogy and inclusion. In edited collections, she has published 2 political science articles (1 of them co-authored) and 2 pieces on pedagogy and inclusion (1 of them co-

- authored).
- Published 30 public-facing pieces (20 of them co-authored) in such venues as Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, and The Washington Post (The Monkey Cage).
- Awarded grants from the American Political Science Association totaling more than \$8,000.
   She also won a \$230,000 grant from the Global Research Institute and W&M Provost (to hire a post-doctoral fellow) in 2022.
- Reviewer comment: "Dr. Zvobgo's reputation and high-quality work make her a slam dunk for promotion to associate professor with tenure at almost any research-intensive university in the world."

- Served on Department of Government search committee for an assistant professor, on the curriculum committee and the scholarship committee, and helped organize the departmental research colloquium series.
- For Arts & Sciences and the university, she founded the International Justice Lab and has been its director since 2019.
- Professor Zvobgo has provided valuable service to the discipline of Political Science. Since 2019, she has served on the executive committee of the Woman's Caucus and the People of Color Also Know Stuff of the leading Association for International Relations scholars, the International Studies Association (ISA). Also for ISA, she served in 2022 on the committee for the best dissertation in Human Rights and was appointed chair of the Committee on Status of Representation and Diversity. In these leadership positions, which are rare for such a young scholar, Professor Zvobgo promoted women scholars and scholars of color, who are significantly underrepresented in IR.
