Fiscal Year 2025-26 USHE Capital Budget Recommendation – Technical College Non-Dedicated Capital Projects

The Commissioner's office received three technical college non-dedicated capital project requests for Board consideration in its FY 2025-26 capital budget recommendation. These three projects were scored according to the FY 2025-26 capital development priority guidelines, which yielded the following results:

While serving as a useful benchmark for initial Board review, the scoring results depicted above warrant qualification. Data limitations, scoring methodology shortcomings and potential forthcoming space utilization definitional changes all contribute to the Commissioner's recommendation that the Board adopt a final prioritization ranking that incorporates considerations outside of the formal quantitative scoring framework.

This project will add 91,700SF of learning space to the Dixie Tech campus and allow the college to meet its mandate to provide a technically skilled workforce to meet local industry demand in the fastest-growing region in the state. The project will enable Dixie Tech to meet strong and unmet demand by industry for graduates in Dixie Tech's Transportation Technologies, Construction Tech, and Computer Tech programs by creating new space for them, allowing growth in the equally in-demand Medical/Healthcare and Welding programs.

By relocating to a new, purpose-built facility, Southwest Technical College can better accommodate projected growth, enhance training capabilities, and repurpose the existing space to expand in-demand manufacturing programs. This new Public Safety Building at Southwest Technical College will significantly expand the college's capacity to offer comprehensive training programs in Firefighting, Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT), and Paramedics. This facility will meet the growing demand for skilled public safety professionals in the region. The relocation of these programs will free up space in the existing Health Professions and Trades Building, which will be repurposed to expand the college's manufacturing programs.

UBTech's new Health Science building will be the educational foundation supporting the growth and expansion of the region's medical services. Historically, 90% of the support staff in the region's two expanding medical centers receive or begin their educational training at the college. The new Health Science Building includes space for expanding student capacity of the college's existing healthcare-related programs and courses, including but not limited to Practical Nursing, Medical Assistant, Nursing Assistant, Pharmacy Technician, Surgical Technician, and additionally in Anatomy and Physiology, Sports Medicine, Exercise Science, Medical Terminology, Medical Math as well as Line Cook and Culinary Arts. As the Health Science building is funded, the college will add Dental Assistant, EMT/Paramedic, Ultrasound Technician, and Meat Science programs, which the local industry has requested for years.

Board Considerations

In its July 2024 meeting, the Board adopted FY 2025-26 capital budget guidance that contemplated an annual distribution of the \$19.3 million in ongoing Technical College Capital Project Fund appropriations directly to technical colleges through a formula similar to the one used to annually allocate dedicated project funds to degree-granting institutions. With this change, the legislative ask for technical college non-dedicated capital project funding will be greater than it would have been otherwise, since only the dedicated allocation to the institution for which the non-dedicated capital project is recommended will be available to buy down the total cost of the project. This change may justify the Board putting a greater weight on lower-cost projects such as Southwest Tech's Public Safety Building. Conversely, Dixie Tech's Trades & Technology Building was ranked by the previous Board as a meritorious project and is responsive to the workforce needs of one of the fastest-growing metropolitan statistical areas in the country, while Uintah Basin Tech's Health Sciences Building would help to mitigate critical healthcare occupational shortages in rural Utah.

Commissioner's Recommendation

The Commissioner recommends that the Board review and prioritize technical college non-dedicated project requests. The Commissioner further recommends that the Board defer a decision until the next budget cycle as to whether the technical college non-dedicated projects and their ranking should be frozen for FY 2027.
