
Transform the student experience.



The TSC Men's Half Marathon team placed 3rd at Nationals.


After finishing 4th at the NJCAA Cross Country Championships the TSC Trojan men had a tall order improving upon the week's accolades. However, as has become a regular occurrence in recent years, the Trojans outdid themselves. The field slated to compete was touted as the strongest to ever take the starting line at an NJCAA Championship. It would live up to predictions, with three individuals going under the previous championship record time.

Brian Rotich's time of 1 hour 4 minutes and 49 seconds was ten seconds under the previous National Record. A few minutes later Emmanuel Biwott flashed across the finish line in 11th place individually, taking his second All-American honor of the weekend. Right behind was Regan Longei who out raced another athlete to the line to also take his second All-American Honor of the weekend. The Trojans would finish in 3rd place as a team.

- Jack Wiley, Dean of Instruction, was chosen again this year as a National FFA (Future Farmers of America) Judge. Said Jack, "I recently judged the National FFA Proficiency awards. What an opportunity to interview four very talented young people from across the nation. Earlier in the year I judged a preliminary round from which the finalists were chosen. I have judged the state contests in New Mexico, Texas, Colorado, and Oklahoma. Several years ago, I had the opportunity to judge the national public speaking contest. I am very proud to be a part of the FFA's national contests."
- Criminal justice students on the Trinidad campus appreciated a presentation by
 Detective Sgt. Jen Lay from the Trinidad Police Dept on a homicide case that she
 was the lead detective on. This was an excellent opportunity for students to
 engage with Detective Lay and understand the complex process and intricates of
 working this type of case.
- Faculty members frequently share their expertise with our communities through our local newspapers and radio stations. Bob Philbin, physics and astronomy faculty member, shared information about the Milky Way Zodiacal light in an October article in The Chronicle-News; Dr. Sue Nesbitt's (psychology faculty) most recent "Thriving" column in the paper talked about how we can learn about ourselves by examining our assumptions. Dr. Kelly Kissane, biology faculty, shares monthly "Science Views from the Valley" on a KRZA radio program. TSC students, sponsored by geology and anthropology faculty member, Bill Hatcher, have a monthly information and interviews program on KRZA about important

- topics of the day. Athletic Director, Mike Salbato, is a frequent guest of KCRT in Trinidad sharing news of our athletes and sports programs.
- First Fridays continues in Trinidad with an Art Walk in the Corazon de Trinidad.
 TSC Arts Committee sponsor an open mic during First Fridays and feature a poet
 or author. Students, community, and fellow faculty and staff attend, participate
 and enjoy. In November, featured poet was Hailey Bearden.

Colorado Senator Cleave Simpson with the CCCS Legislator of the Year


award for his leadership moving forward the bill which passed dropping the word "junior" from both Trinidad State's and Otero College's names.
