Family & Community Education & Engagement Work

- Parent Focus Groups were conducted. Qualitative data indicated the following:
 - Parents expressed the joys of living in a small community, but addressed the many barriers of living in a small town.
 - Parents are looking for parent education and advice from their child’s school and or their doctor.
 - Libraries are a great at offering programming, but programming is unavailable to families with two working parents.
 - A desire to have a newsletter about community events, programs, and resources available via email.
 - Majority of parents expressed interest in open house style programming with games, activities, and socialization.
 - *“As you continue programming, please don’t get discouraged by low attendance. The families who attend greatly appreciate it. More will eventually show up. Give it time.” - Forrestville Valley School District parent*
- Trauma Responsive Schools Assessment underway in the following schools: AFC elementary, AFC jr/sr high school, Paw Paw, Amboy Junior High School, C4C, Fulton elementary, middle and high school
- Mindful Trails in Partnership with U of I Extension are at the printers
 - Traveling trails launching this spring
 - Permanent trails, target date of spring 2024. Partnering with WACC
- Social Emotional Learning (SEL) StoryWalk Sets are also being developed
- Our SEL Coach will be trained in Teen Mental Health First Aid
- ROE PL/Ed Services team members are available and provide family engagement activities at two or more community events per month.

Early Childhood 0-5 Work

- A Strategic Plan has been developed with the following goals
 - Promote and connect families to ECEC programs and services.

- Increase collaboration amongst providers to ensure seamless delivery system, appropriate placement and access to services, and reduction of redundancies in services.
- Grow ECEC workforce in Region 47 to address identified barriers to enrollment due to lack of qualified workforce.
- Increase the number of available 0-3 & 3 - 5 slots
- Improved school readiness and success.
- Increase the programs and services provided to children and families by the ROE
- ROE 47 is now able to provide Gateways training and credit for childcare and early childhood providers.
- Representative are serving on the Birth to Five Illinois Action Council
- Family focus groups and community play dates were held in March
- Community baby showers with a parent education component will be offered in July in Dixon. If you are interested in donating to the shower, please contact Grace Heimerdinger-Baake.
- Onesies and coordinated intake information will be provided to area hospitals to send home with new parents
- Coordinated intake and early childhood buckslips have been redesigned (marketing materials) have been created and printed

Nexus:

The NEXUS Program is the recipient of a \$7,000 grant from the Rochelle Community Foundation. Funds will be used to expand and support IRIS partnerships in the Rochelle community (picture below).

We continue to work with families with over 5,000 family contacts and almost 200 referrals into the Nexus program.

We are posting another full-time position for a Nexus family support specialist due to the expansion of the program and the overall need in our 3 county area.



Parents as Teachers First Years

As we enter the final quarter of this fiscal year, we are already thinking about next year! We have started to work on implementing program improvements for next year and are excited to explore what new opportunities may come from “living” in a new space. The parent

educators are getting excited about their new offices and the collaboration opportunities that may come from being housed with the rest of the ROE staff.

Here's a copy of an article we recently submitted to the Sauk Valley Area Chamber of Commerce:

Local home visiting programs are a critical resource for new and expectant parents, providing one-on-one support at no cost to eligible families. Home visiting programs provide private family coaching and resources, promote infant and child

health, foster educational development and school readiness, and help prevent child abuse and neglect. Research tells us that the most rapid period of brain development occurs within the first three years of life, laying the foundation for all future learning, behavior and health.

Three years ago, the Governor's Office of Early Childhood Development initiated a project in partnership with The Sauk Valley STARS Early Childhood Education Coalition and their home visiting partners, Parents as Teachers First Years, Healthy Families, and Early Head Start, to implement a Coordinated Intake system using IRIS (Integrated Referral and Intake System) across Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside Counties. This system helps to improve access to resources for families, and most importantly, helps to improve equitable access to high-

quality early childhood programs that enables children, with the support of their families and communities, to grow up safe, healthy, happy, and ready to succeed.

Coordinated Intake provides a centralized hub where participating community agencies can use the IRIS system to make referrals to other programs and services that can benefit their clients and their families. The Regional Office of Education #47 serves as the intake hub for families who need assistance connecting with home visiting or other early childhood programs, and for schools to connect with the ROE’s Student and Family Care programs, including Nexus and Truancy.

The ROE is also piloting a project with the University of Kansas Center for Public Partnerships & Research, the RIS program developers, to explore how the IRIS Coordinated Intake system could be utilized in the business sector to support local employee access to community resources or as a way for a business to receive referrals for potential new hires. We are looking for a small to medium sized business (under 100 employees) who is interested in learning more about this opportunity.
