Needed Programs & Services	Initiatives and Purposes	
Title IV Processing & Education	The Title IV Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin in programs and activities in public schools and institution of higher education. Student Affairs personnel are requesting training, professional development, and educational workshops on the topic and the college's procedures and processes for complaints and cases filed. Currently, Dine' College's Title IV Coordinator position is vacant.	
Federal Grant Allowable & Unallowable Costs	Dine' College Student Affairs is a recipient of several federal grants. Student Affairs will revisit and research the federal guidelines and regulations specified in the EDGAR-Part 75 and the 2 CFR-Part 200, Subparts D,E, and F to define the allowable and unallowable costs for consultant services, employee compensations, time and effort reports, food services, and reimbursement. This is essential as Student Affairs closes out the current five (5) year grant and begins preparing to submit a new grant proposal with the U.S. Department of Education.	
Student Retention Services	Tsaile Campus has two Student Support Specialist on board to work directly with students who are placed on academic probation, students with disabilities, and at-risk students. The current and exiting student information system lacks an efficient early alert automated notification process that identifies students who may be experiencing academic, personal, and social challenges. Student Affairs will research alternative early alert systems to improve/increase student success and retention.
