Classified: David Martinez, Groundskeeper



New Memorial Scholarship

Qualifications for this \$1000 scholarship include being a Level I or II nursing student and a permanent resident of Baca, Bent, Cheyenne, Kiowa, or Prowers County.

Colorado Online @LCC

On Wednesday January 25th, Dr. Landon Pirius will be on LCC campus to update and address questions from the LCC faculty and staff about the Rural College Consortium and transition to Colorado Online @ LCC from CCCOnline. Dr. Pirius will have a chance to tour campus and review all the LCC technology and our advancements locally and offer insights into how we can best utilize and combine the technology with the new platform.

IREPO Technology and Video Walls

The IREPO grant was used to purchase Samsung DirectView Fine Pitch Video Walls to replace the outdated projector systems that were utilized for many years in the Bowman building large and small lecture halls. The previous projector systems were clunky and allowed cords to not only be seen but to also be in the foot path of students and instructors. The new technology is more modern and creates a clutter free space in the open staging area allowing for more demonstratable products to be viewed. These walls have a 160 degree viewing angle both vertical and horizontal and are made up of several small screens perfectly designed to connect with each other and display crisp, clean images suited for the technology of today.



New Classes

Lamar Community College has opened new classes this Spring and many students have flocked to be included on the roster. A Photography mini-mester course taught by Jennifer Goodland, instructor and LCC's very own Library Director, explores the creative uses of lighting from the perspective of fine art photography with an emphasis on portraiture, three dimensional object photography, and two dimensional collage photography. This course began January 2nd and welcomed many students back from Winter Break. The Ceramics courses, taught by Donnie Hollingsworth and begins January 19th 2023, introduces traditional and contemporary forms and processes including handbuilding and throwing on the potter's wheel with an emphasis on skill, technique and form.
