Student Government Association Elections/Vote

The technology is \$4.85 per credit hour a semester. Starting in fall 2024:

- 25% of the funding goes toward subsidizing computers for students, and
- 75% of the funding goes toward modernizing and updating class/lab technology.

Students also voted on the following for SGA leadership: Tron Jarret, President; Jillian Stork, Vice President; Alicia Esparza, State Student Advisory Council Representative; and Michelle Harris Diversity and Public Relations Senator.

Peak Education & PPSC: The State of Post-Secondary Access in Colorado Springs



CDHE Leadership Visits PPSC







Dr. Angie Paccione, the Executive Director for the Colorado Department of Higher Education (CDHE), visited PPSC on Wednesday, April 3. She was joined by two of her commissioners, and members of her cabinet. They met with the PPSC Executive Leadership Team, and staff members from the College's Center for Healthcare Education & Simulation (CHES). Following a tour of the CHES Campus, the group engaged in lively discussion about Diversity, Equity and Inclusion work at PPSC, CDHE, in Colorado, and across the nation. They also discussed Senate Bill 164: the Student Bill of Rights, non-credit courses in Colorado, and how PPSC can assist in helping grow Promise Programs throughout Colorado.



President Bolton Becomes Chair of CCAP

During its national conference in Austin, Texas, College Board named PPSC President Dr. Lance Bolton chair of its Community College Advisory Panel (CCAP). The panel assists the College Board in serving community colleges and promotes national recognition of the role of community colleges in providing access to higher education to many students across the U.S. CCAP also encourages increased participation of community colleges in College Board membership, meetings, governance, and advisory activities to build partnerships with schools and other sectors of higher education on behalf of educational excellence for all students.

President Bolton Serves on Panel at Prepárate Conference

PPSC President, Dr. Lance Bolton, served as a panelist at the 2024 Prepárate Conference in Austin, Texas. He was joined by four panelists representing colleges from across the U.S. Together they shared insights on financial aid empowerment and discussed the impact of FAFSA delays, specifically for Latine families. The group also shared strategies for navigating financial aid complexities when working with Latine students. They discussed innovative approaches to mitigate FAFSA delays and provided actionable takeaways to enhance college efforts in facilitating financial aid access for Latine students.

Career & Transfer Fairs

Students polished their resumes and sported their best interview outfits for the PPSC Spring Community Career Fair. They networked with representatives from businesses such as: KKTV Channel 11, Bal Seal, Colorado Springs Utilities, El Paso County and Walmart Data Services.

Days later, representatives from 16 colleges and universities visited Centennial Campus to help students navigate the college/university transfer process. Scholarship representatives were also available to help students learn about transfer student scholarships.
