



Chapter 3: Population Estimates

Wyoming 2022 Population: 581,381

• From 2021 to 2022, 0.3% increase (1,898)

Surpassed 2019 population (578,759)

• From 2012 to 2022, 0.9% increase (5,076)




Figure 3.3: Percent Change in Wyoming Population by County as of July 1, 2020-2022




Figure: Wyoming Unemployment Insurance Benefit Recipients, 1997-2022




Figure 7.2: Total Number of Persons Working in Wyoming at Any Time by Age, 2000-2022




Figure 7.2: Total Number of Persons Working in Wyoming at Any Time by Age, 2000-2022




Figure: Persons Ages 25-34 and 55 and Older Working in Wyoming at Any Time During the Year, 2018-2022




Figure 8.1: Educational Attainment for Wyoming and U.S. Populations, 2021

Chapter 10: Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics

STEM Occupations

- 11,940 STEM jobs in Wyoming
- 4.3% of all jobs
- Higher wages
- Almost all require postsecondary education



Chapter 11: Benefits Survey

Benefits

- Collects information on types of benefits offered
- 65.2% offered health insurance
- 39.4% offered paid sick leave
- 71.3% offered access to a retirement plan

Chapter 14: Census of Fatal Occupational Injuries

Occupational Fatalities

- 27 in 2021, down from 35 in 2020
- One in three were transportation incidents
- 10 in natural resources & mining
- 7 in construction



Chapter 15: Survey of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses

Occupational Injuries

Rate of 3.1% in 2021

- Highest incidence rated were related to health care
- Local government nursing & residential care facilities
