



GRANT FUNDING REQUEST FORM



The State of Minnesota prohibits cities from making charitable contributions. But, Princeton's Municipal Liquor Store, *Princeton Wine and Spirits* (PW&S) is allowed to provide grants for worthwhile community events. Annually, the City Council budgets Liquor Store funds for those types of purposes. Because there are numerous worthwhile causes and it is not possible to fulfill all grant requests, the criteria the City uses to determine how best to allocate the budgeted funds includes, but is not limited to, the following:

1. The requesting group/organization must be located within the 55371 zip code.
2. The mission or goal of the requesting group/organization must benefit individuals who reside within the 55371 zip code.
3. Generally, retail promotions are not eligible for grant funding.
4. Groups/organizations are limited to one grant within a 12 month period.
5. Because funds are limited, the city reserves the right to contribute less than the full amount actually requested.
6. The requesting group/organization may not be engaged in political activity.
7. Priority is given to groups/events that promote restricting youth access to alcohol and/or the responsible use of alcohol by adults.

8 DOMAINS OF LIVABILITY

The availability and quality of these community features impact the well-being of all residents and help make communities more livable for people of ALL ages.



1. Outdoor Spaces & Buildings. People need public places to gather - indoors and out. Green spaces, outdoor seating and accessible buildings (elevators, stairs with railings) can be used and enjoyed by people of all ages.



2. Transportation. Driving shouldn't be the only way to get around. Pedestrians need sidewalks and safe, crossable streets. Dedicated bicycle lanes benefit nondrivers and drivers alike. Public transit options can range from the large-scale (buses) to the small (taxis, shuttles or ride share services).



3. Housing. Most people want to remain in their own home and community for as long as possible. Doing so is possible if housing is designed or modified for aging in place and a community has housing options that are suitable for differing incomes, ages and life stages.



4. Social Participation. Regardless of a person's age, loneliness is often as debilitating a health condition as having a chronic illness or disease. Sadness and isolation can be combated by having opportunities to socialize and the availability of accessible, affordable and fun social activities.



5. Respect & Social Inclusion. Everyone wants to feel valued. Intergenerational gatherings and activities are a great way for young and older people to learn from one another, honor what each has to offer and feel good about themselves.



6. Work & Civic Engagement. An age-friendly community encourages people to be actively engaged in community life and has opportunities for residents to work for pay or volunteer their skills.



7. Communication & Information. Age-friendly communities recognize that not everyone has a smartphone or Internet access and that information needs to be disseminated through a variety of means.



8. Community & Health Services. At some point, every person of every age gets hurt, becomes ill or simply needs some help. While it is important that assistance and care be available nearby, it's essential that residents are able to access and afford the services required.
