State of Colorado Air Quality Control Commission visit to campus

The college's role in a Just Transition was the theme of the visit and conversations between the Colorado Air Quality Control Commission and CNCC's Craig team. The AQCC visited Craig in late June for their annual retreat – the first in-person meet they'd held since March 2020. As part of the retreat, they toured the hall of Dinosaurs and the Northwestern Field Museum – a federal and state designated fossil repository on the Craig Campus – to learn about the efforts the college is taking to create a "bump" on the tourist map. Encouraging visitors to meet the scientists, see the fossils and spend a night in Craig. The next day Arts and Sciences Dean Jesse LaRose and Executive Director of Workforce Education & Economic Development Sasha Nelson provided a 30-minute presentation on the theme, shared information about new programs like Cybersecurity (accredited by HLC May 2021) and those in development. AQCC members spent time asking questions and offering suggestions to connect the college to additional resources in aid of growing awareness and enrollment.

Cybersecurity Bootcamp - Wednesday, June 16, 2021

CNCC conducted its first Annual Cybersecurity Bootcamp which was attended by eight Northwestern Colorado Area teenagers. The bootcamp opened with statements from the Craig Mayor. The students continued with an ice-breaker exercise followed by network fundamentals and binary math competitions. After a healthy lunch and a campus tour, the teenagers worked with their hands to learn copper and fiber optic cabling as well as working with circuit boards. Finally, the participants conducted a Q & A session with IT industry professionals followed up with competition and door prizes presented to the teenagers by the then CNCC President Ron Granger.



Firefighters

For the first few weeks of July, the CNCC Rangely campus was hopping. Not with students, but with firefighters who were using our campus as the staging area for the Oil Springs fire. These men and women put everything on the line to control that fire and, even though it took a little time, were able to contain it and keep all of us safe.

Several representatives from CNCC, including employees and aviation students attended the annual Kenney Reservoir Splash-In held on Saturday July 17, 2021 at Kenney Reservoir in Rangely, CO. This is an annual event coordinated by Ray Hawkins, Director of the Colorado Seaplane Initiative. Participants were invited to take rides in Seaplanes, allowing aviation students to experience water landings and to learn differing safety protocols present in these planes. Dr. Lisa Jones, President of CNCC enjoyed engaging with students, members of the community, event organizers and CNCC donors. She took a ride with CNCC alum, pilot, seaplane enthusiast, and philanthropist, Carl Mattson.

The college's paleontology program offers multiple learning opportunities including an area of emphasis for students seeking an Associate of Science and field and lab courses to provide hands on experience. The field and lab programs are also open to non-credit, community members who are interested in contributing their time and talent to the scientific work.
