

 For example, allow pets on restaurant patios.
- Encourage a pet-friendly local business program with consistent guidelines and signage.





Here are a few potential next steps as you continue your journey...

- 1. Educate about responsible pet ownership on your social media and/or website. This is a low-cost way to consistently share information about avoiding dog bites, pet safety, etc. You can find free resources on our site in this toolkit.
- 2. Evaluate your local ordinances to make sure they support pets and pet parents and help end pet homelessness. Here are <u>model ordinances</u> to help.
- 3. Engage local businesses in a <u>Pets Welcome program</u> with **consistent pet-friendly guidelines and signage**. This can be a great way to demonstrate support for pet-friendly programs and show citizens the city cares about pets.
- **4. Explore safety net opportunities** to help people facing barriers to keeping their pets. This toolkit shared by PEDIGREE Foundation and HASS can help.
- Consider formalizing TNR in your city to manage and support community cats.

- 6. Engage your Parks/Facilities department in a project to add **pet drinking fountains and relief areas** in public areas. Surveys on social media and at local events can help determine needed locations.
