


Lamar Community College President's Report September 2022

New Employees


Welcome Shuamae Maestas

Strategic Planning – Action Priority Groups

As part of the 2020-2025 Strategic Plan, each year LCC focuses on one theme and engages the entire college in action priorities related to that theme. Year one was "aesthetics/amenities", year two was "communication" and this year's focus is "expanding access". The President's Leadership Council's (PLC) ad hoc planning group – Kelly Emick, Robert Vazquez, Kyle Lasley, Shealynn Robins, Jennifer Goodland, and Courtney Beshara – worked with PLC and Dr. Lujan to identify priorities for this year. In the longstanding tradition of process improvement from LCC's many years as an Academic Quality Improvement Project (AQIP) campus, each employee will participate in one of the projects.

1. College-wide Priority Projects

1.1. Student Success Priority

Recommend updated schedule courses, programs, and services to fit the needs of the communities we serve. Look at hours of operation, course availability, services, etc. to see if we are meeting the needs of the students we want to serve.

1.2. Community Success Priority

Develop calendar, responsible parties, and processes, to successfully plan, coordinate, and offer meaningful campus events to bring community members, potential students, and others to LCC throughout the year. Examples include Career Fairs, Knowledge Bowl, Girls in the Middle, FFA Conference, Transfer Fairs, Colorado History Day, etc.

1.3. Resource Success Priority

Increase recruitment activities and strategies for enrollment growth in all categories of students, including adult learners.

1.4. Employee Success Priority

Work with employees and the Employee Engagement Committee to expand opportunities for employees to support campus events and activities (including athletic events), increase wellness activities, and engage with each other.

In addition to college-wide projects each department and unit may have its own action priorities and projects related to expanding access (removing barriers).

COPERR House

LCC completed its first home remodel under the COPERR Grant awarded by the Colorado Attorney General's Office. The home at 406 East Oak Street in Lamar was completed in early May, and an Open House was held on Friday, May 6th. Originally the COPERR House was purchased for \$5,000 and approximately \$120,000 worth of improvements was put into it including new floor joists, sub floors, windows, and walls. Nearly the entirety of the interior and exterior of the house was remodeled by the LCC Construction Trades students, minus items

such as the installation of the HVAC unit and air conditioner. Closing on the COPERR House occurred on September 7th, 2022 and was purchased for \$179,416 by Dale and Donetta Willhite, longtime Holly residents and owners of Scooters in Lamar, and soon Pueblo.





Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative

The prestigious Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative Collegiate Program at UCCS College of Business fellowships are awarded to UCCS educators who demonstrate excellence in pedagogical activities related to applied business, professional and organizational ethics. UCCS fellows work with ethics champions from nine colleges and universities in southern Colorado through the UCCS Southern Colorado Higher Education Consortium Ethics Champions Program. Lamar Community College is proud to be apart of this initiative and have nominated Student Life Coordinator Yolanda Herrera and English Faculty Dr. Zachary Sands as our 2022-2023 Ethics Champions.

LCC Updated Campus Signage




Boots, Bling & Blessings
