Create education without barriers through partnerships

Visit to South Korea – PCC President Dr. Patty Erjavec and Dean of Arts and Sciences Young Kim traveled to South Korea with representatives of Seoul-based CS Wind and Pueblo city officials to learn more about opportunities to collaborate on education and workforce development. Erjavec signed a memorandum of understanding with Lee Jang-ho, president of Kunsan National University, to provide exchange opportunities for students and faculty.

CS Wind recently purchased from Vestas its wind tower production facility, located in Pueblo. CS Wind plans to significantly expand its tower production and is committed to collaborating with PCC to build an even stronger pipeline of welders and other skilled workers for the Pueblo plant.



CEO summit – PCC hosted a virtual CEO Summit Sept. 15 with business leaders from throughout the school's service area. Staff presented information about the many ways PCC can help businesses, including apprenticeships, stackable credentials, P-Tech programs and customizable training.

Hispanic Heritage Month events – PCC's Title V OPTICA grant team hosted a Sept. 20 webinar watch party for GlobalMindED's equity event, *Courageous Conversations: What is Hispanic Heritage Month and What Does it Mean for Equity, Justice, Opportunity, and Culture?* Students, faculty and staff from all PCC campuses were able to take part.

Webex presentation *Shut Up! Censorship as Common Cause* Sept. 22 for students, faculty and staff. Guest speaker <u>James LaRue</u> discussed the recent surge in political and academic attempts to remove books from libraries. In addition to being a longtime library director in Colorado, LaRue is the author of "The New Inquisition: Understanding and Managing Intellectual Freedom Challenges" and the former director of the Freedom to Read Foundation and the American Library Association's Office for Intellectual Freedom.
