Otero Dance Studio, formerly known as the OJC Dance Studio, celebrated 40 years of dance on Dec. 17 and 18 in the Ed Stafford Theatre.

The founder, Darlene Blackford, started the program back in 1981 when she saw a need for dance in the community. With amazing support from Otero Junior College, now Otero College, and the community, the dance program grew and offered more and more classes through the years to become more than just an after-school dance program.
