## STATE BOARD FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES AND OCCUPATIONAL EDUCATION April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2022

#### **EXPLANATION:**

The legislative session convened on January 12<sup>th</sup> and is on track to conclude on Wednesday, May 11<sup>th</sup>. In late March, the Joint Budget Committee (JBC) finalized the state budget, referred to as the "Long Bill." With federal ARPA funding and higher than expected revenue collections, this is the second year in a row that the JBC has had more flexibility to increase funding for higher education, capital construction, controlled maintenance, and IT projects – making this another good year for CCCS project requests and other funding-related items.

The JBC approved \$105.3 million to higher education institutions for FY-23, equating to a 11.4% increase above last year's appropriation, and flexibility for tuition increases up to 2 percent. Approximately \$27.8 million will be allocated to CCCS.

With regard to capital requests, the JBC approved \$46.9 million for five CCCS college capital construction projects, \$28.8 million for controlled maintenance needs, and \$10.8 million for three college IT projects. See table below for list of college projects approved for funding.

# Update on CCCS-initiated bills:

# LPN-to-BSN Bridge Program

<u>SB22-003 "Community College Nursing Bachelor Degree Eligibility"</u> passed both the House and Senate Chambers unanimously and on Thursday, April 7<sup>th</sup>, Governor Polis signed the bill in a signing ceremony. The bill includes a petition clause, meaning the legislation will officially become law 90 days after the Governor's signature.

The legislation will allow CCCS colleges, as well as Aims Community College, to offer a streamlined and cost-effective pathway for licensed practical nurse (LPN) students to earn a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree. Bill sponsors included Senators Janet Bucker and Kerry Donovan, and Representatives Kyle Mullica and Tony Exum.

## Pikes Peak Community College Name Change

HB22-1280 "Pikes Peak Community College Name Change" was introduced on March 4<sup>th</sup> and assigned to House Education Committee. The bill seeks to change the name of Pikes Peak Community College to "Pikes Peak State College." This effort is being led by PPCC leadership and has tremendous support from their campus and local community. The intent of the legislation is to support PPCC's efforts to modernize their name and increase their value-perception among students and employers, and to effectively market the institution to help foster enrollment growth, build partnerships, and increase overall competitiveness in the Colorado Springs region. The proposed legislation would not change PPCC's role and mission.

HB 22-1280 Status:

- 03/24/22 Passed House Education Committee unanimously, 9-0.
- 03/29/22 Passed the House Chamber, 64-1.
- 04/07/22 Calendared for Senate Education Committee.

#### Approved Ballot Initiative:

Dozens of initiatives have been filed and are under review by the Sectary of State's Office. So far, one initiative has been approved for the 2022 election, <u>Initiative #31,</u> <u>State Income Tax Rate Reduction</u>. The measure would reduce the state income tax rate for individuals and corporations from 4.55% to 4.41%. According to Legislative Council Staff, the measure decreases state General Fund revenue by an estimated \$572.1 million in FY 2022-23 and \$397.9 million for FY 2023-24, with ongoing decreases in later years, fiscal impact statement linked here.

If passed by voters, this will indirectly impact CCCS via less General Fund revenue available for higher education in the future.

#### Lobbyist Report:

CCCS lobbyists will give the Board a brief summary of additional "Under the Dome" highlights and provide insight on bills and initiatives on affecting higher education.

#### Bills Monitored by CCCS:
