Lamar Community College was overjoyed to invite over 150 students to join Phi Theta Kappa in the Spring semester. These students have all completed at least 25% of their certificate or degree and hold at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA in their degree/certificate coursework. Phi Theta Kappa is the oldest and largest academic honor society for two-year colleges, and it has an excellent national reputation for the quality of its students. Joining Phi Theta Kappa is an excellent way for students to expand their college experience, meet other high performing students, build their resume, gain leadership and service skills, and take advantage of many scholarship and career-building opportunities. Phi Theta Kappa held New Member Induction on April 5th. Phi Theta Kappa officers selected Dr. Reyes as their keynote speaker and were excited to meet LCC's new president and to hear her inspiring speech.



Transfer Degree Meetings

CCCS Student Excellence Awards

Stories of Our People






Seaboard Foods

National Intercollegiate Ranch and Stock Horse Association (NIRSHA)

This year, the Lamar Community College Ranch Horse Team competed at the NIRSHA Collegiate National Finals in Amarillo, TX for the first time. We had three outstanding students competing against students from up to 18 other schools. One of the EBM & HTM Freshmen, Aubrie Brown, was chosen as a finalist for a \$6,000 scholarship from the Fort Worth Stock Show. This is a great honor for LCC! The judges expressed how impressive our team was for their first year and we are excited to take our team back next year!

American Historical Association

LCC Librarian Jennifer Goodland has been accepted to present her research on "An Unorganized Crime Family: The Childs of New York City" at the conference of the Pacific Coast Branch of the American Historical Association. This talk covers document analysis and research methodologies concerning fraudulent criminal activity in the 19th century. The conference takes place at California State University-Northridge, August 9-11, 2023. Jennifer also delivered a lecture, Q&A, and discussion on "Where did They Settle, and How do I Find it?: Researching Homestead Act Land Records" at the Big Timbers Museum in Lamar, Colorado. Over 50 people were in attendance, with some coming as far away as Kansas.

College Updates:

- Summer 2023 FTE enrollment is currently 16% up compared to last year. Headcount is 18% up in comparison to last year at this time.
- COSI grants for the workforce, concurrent, and Finish What You Started initiatives are actively reviewing and seeking additional opportunities to support current and future students in attaining educational opportunities. Since February, the College increased the number of Back to Work Grant from 13 to 20, with 5 additional potential students in verification. The goal of this grant is for LCC to serve 65 completers when the grant ends in June 2024. Finish What You Start Grant increased from 6 to 13 since February, with 5 pending documentation to move to completion status. This grant aims to serve 45 completers by 2025. COSI Grant also increased from 39 to 44 students. This grant seeks to help 106 students.
- The Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions (DHSI) Program provides grants to assist HSIs in expanding educational opportunities for and improving the attainment of Hispanic students. These grants also enable HSIs to expand and enhance their academic offerings, program quality, and institutional stability. The College is currently preparing an application for this grant, which will be submitted in early June 2023.
- Skill Advance Colorado grant funding is set for a new grant cycle; LCC will be
 engaging in Workforce related programming to support local industries in various
 training aimed at meeting the needs of incumbent workers and re-skilling and upskill training to advance our regional economy further. Launch dates will begin at
 the beginning of the next fiscal year; planning is underway.
- CCCS has established a 5% tuition increase (In-State & Out-of-State), a 2.5% online courses tuition increase (In-State & Out-of-State), a 5% staff and full-time faculty salary increase, and a 10% adjunct salary increase.
- Chancellor's Summit on Adult Education will be held in Denver on June 1. This conference will allow us to learn best practices around prior learning assessment, adult recruitment, engagement, competency-based assessment, etc. This initiative is part of the system REACH Collaborative, focused on creating clear

paths for more Black, Hispanic, and Native American adults to grow their skills and advance their careers.

Construction Updates:

Dayne Crockett of Skyler Design has provided updated schedules on the roof replacement for Bowman, Wellness, Trustees, and Betz. Recent rains have helped to identify some of the problems. Ready Roofers and Skyler Design were on campus on 4/25/23, addressing many of these problems. Please remember that regular assessments and inspections occur throughout the project. These are done by the Engineers, RoofTech Consultants, and the State Inspectors, Steve Hall. In addition, following these final inspections, all roofs will be flooded, drains will be tested, and verification of no leaks will follow.

IREPO Updates:

The IREPO Grant has been instrumental in enhancing LCC's teaching and learning experience by incorporating state-of-the-art technology to fostering a more engaging, active learning environment. As a result, both students and instructors have benefited from improved access to resources and more interactive classrooms. We transformed 22 classrooms with the addition of 2-4 85" flat screens each and new projectors, enabling seamless connectivity for instructors and students. Our lecture halls have also been upgraded with 3x3 ft and 4x4 ft display arrays. To make the technology even more accessible, all instructors have been equipped with Microsoft Surface Pros, allowing them to connect in any room via docking stations effortlessly. In addition, we have implemented a Microsoft Surface checkout program through our library, enabling students without personal laptops to borrow a Surface for the entire semester at no cost. Complementing this, we offered a Wi-Fi/hotspot checkout service for students and athletes who may experience connectivity issues at home or while traveling. In line with our vision of active learning, all classrooms have been furnished with new, versatile furniture designed to facilitate collaboration and integration with technology upgrades. All classroom furniture is mobile and can be shifted to complement the technology or curriculum. Our commitment to education extends beyond LCC, as we have equipped 15 local high schools with flat screens on mobile carts to support concurrent enrollment learners. The IREPO Grant has been extended to September 2023, allowing us time to finalize cosmetic enhancements and the launch of pedagogical trainings.
