

judging.




 Affordability, Quality, Accountability, Resource Development and Operational Excellence

NJC was awarded a grant through the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) to receive bulk orders of Narcan® (naloxone HCl). For those that are not familiar with Narcan®, it reverses the effects of an opioid overdose. Narcan® is available for anyone to take from our community food pantry (Knowles Hall) and the mailroom (Walker Hall).
