## Transform the student experience.



• Congratulations to the Trinidad State Robotics team for their outstanding performance at the 2023 Colorado Space Grant Consortium Robotics Challenge, which was held April 15 at the Great Sand Dunes National Park. The TSC robots, F.R.O.G. and F.L.Y., completed all five courses and were judged to be the best performing robots of the day. Highly impressive, especially since we were up against some of the best universities in Colorado, including Colorado School of Mines and CSU.

But the winnings didn't stop there! At a symposium the following week, our team continued to shine. According to Professor Cindy Clements, "there were two awards for best video, no ranking, and we took one of those." "We then won the grand prize overall for our research paper and presentation. A first for Trinidad state. We have actually now won nine people's choice awards and five session paper awards over the past 14 years, but never have we gotten close to the grand prize." The students brought home a check for \$2,000. Congratulations to Cindy Clements and the entire Robotics team. You have made us proud!

Fair was attended by students from TSC as well as area high school students. Twenty-seven employers talked with students about local job opportunities. Twelve colleges and universities helped students with questions in regards to transferring to a four-year institution after earning a degree or credits from Trinidad State. Prior to the Fair, Student Services offered a Resume Writing workshop and Title V offered a Financial Literacy and Budgeting workshop.



## Transform our own workforce experience.




In another Trinidad State and A.R.Mitchell

Trinidad State Theatre Tech faculty member, Christopher Smith, PH.D., serves our community through his work with the Fox West Theatre Alliance. Recently he curated an art exhibit of Fox West Theatre artifacts at the A.R. Mitchell Museum. Opened in 1908 as a venue for traveling Vaudeville acts, the Fox (named the West until the 1940s) was designed by the Rapp Brothers firm of Trinidad, and was funded by Ed West, a local cattle rancher. It seats 650 people and is Colorado's only two balcony theatre. It boasts a seventy-one foot stage that has hosted a wide array of history's famous performers, including John Philip Sousa, Mother Jones, Roy Rogers, Sitting Bull, Rube Welch, violinist Rubinoff, and many others. The theatre was fully converted into a motion picture theater in 1929, and was operated by the Sawaya family from 1959 until its closure in 2012. • The Trinidad Carnegie Library recent hosted a book signing with Calvin Smith, Coordinator of the Freudenthal Library at Trinidad State College. Calvin has a distinguished career as a local archaeology expert, historian and museum director. He has written a novel, The Mammoth Quest: An Epic Expedition into the Past, about life with the ancient Clovis and Folsom people who lived in this area many thousands of years ago.

The novel is an action-adventure story about the first person to be transported back in time to 13,000 years ago in an attempt to discover the origin, culture and livelihood of the Clovis people who are known to have hunted and killed mammoths with stone tipped darts thrown with atlatls in what is now northern New Mexico.

• The college community celebrated milestone years of service and recent retirees at receptions on each campus.
