Base Increase for Student Affordability and System Operations

\$285 million (base)

- » This request would provide stable state funding to campuses to allow for an overall five percent increase in costs each year
- » The funding would move the system closer to the statutory goal of 67 percent of funding coming from the state and 33 percent of funding coming from students through tuition
- » Focused tuition flexibility would be provided if this request is fully funded

Tuition Flexibility

- » This request is designed to allow the Board of Trustees to set tuition through its extensive consultation process. This process allows decision making to be respected at the campus level.
- » Potential overall tuition increases would be directly related to the amount of additional base funding received out of the \$285 million request
- » Differential tuition rates would be allowed to be adjusted where:
 - costs have increased for reasons outside the institutions control
 - high-cost programs are not covering unique program costs with the current rate
 - online rates are being combined into base rates
- » Individual compelling college and university requests could be considered

Critical Infrastructure Concerns

\$100 million (one-time funds)

» This funding would address the most urgent immediate needs in

- asset preservation (\$50 million)
- building demolition to avoid maintenance costs for un-usable facilities that undermine a campus's sense of community (\$25 million)
- the development of the new Workday student planning system (\$25 million). This student planning system will be significantly more complex than any yet developed in the nation, providing students with extensively valuable online resources



Student Support

\$40 million (base)

- » to provide campus staffing to connect students to essential resources that have been created like the basic needs supports, emergency grants, the Mantra Health mental health resource, and other campus-based resources (\$32.5 million)
- » for emergency grants, which would add \$2.75 million per year to the \$2.25 million per year currently available through OHE (\$5.5 million)
- » to continue current funding levels for the development of free course materials (\$2 million)

Workforce-Focused Program Support

\$40 million (base)

- » to continue the work of upgrading college and university equipment and learning environments for high-cost, high-need workforce programs (\$13.5 million)
- » to continue to develop and expand industry sector programming to build capacity and support new and redesigned curricular options with an emphasis on offering students work-based learning experiences (\$13.5 million)
- » to support the maintenance of high-cost and high-demand career & technical, baccalaureate, and graduate programs (\$8.5 million)
- for workforce scholarships, which would increase the base for these scholarships by \$2.25 million (50 percent) per year and broaden the types of programs the scholarships can be used for (\$4.5 million)

- Nov 19-20, 2024 Board approves biennial budget request; submits request to MMB

 - Legislative Session Ends
 - Board hears first reading of FY2026 operating budgets
 - Board approves FY2026 operating budgets
 - July 1, 2025 System begins FY2026
